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Spot cotton quotations for grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49, in the designated markets averaged 76.13 cents per pound during the week ending Thursday, March 28, according to the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Daily average quotations ranged from a low of 75.88 cents on Monday, March 25, to a high of 76.70 cents on Wednesday, March 27. Spot cotton quotations averaged 76.66 cents a week earlier and 68.53 cents in the corresponding week last year. The New York May 1991 futures settlement price closed on Thursday at 81.82 cents compared with 83.43 cents a week earlier. The October 1991 settlement price was 72.08 cents compared with 72.50 cents a week earlier, and December 1991 was 68.05 cents compared with 67.90 cents the previous week. Spot transactions reported in the designated markets totaled 5,034 bales during the week ending Thursday, March 28. This compares with 17,027 bales reported during the previous week and 38,947 bales in the corresponding week last season.

Southeastern markets. Trading was slow. Grower-held supplies were about depleted. Trading between merchants was active. Prices were steady to firm. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41 and higher, staples 34 and longer, mike 35-49 brought 200 to 250 points off New York May futures, FOB trucks in Georgia. In the Carolinas and Alabama, prices were mostly 350 to 400 points off, FOB warehouse. Grades 42 and 51 traded at around 200 points lower than grade 41. CCC loan equity trading was light. Merchants offered to contract 1991-crop cotton at around 350 to 450 points off December futures, basis grade 41 staple 34. Most growers were reluctant to accept these prices, but a number of contracts were signed by North Carolina growers with acreage outside the farm program. Fieldwork was at a standstill.

South central markets. Grower-to-merchant trading slowed. Very little cotton remained in growers' hands and offerings were almost nil. Merchants had prompt and nearby commitments fairly well covered and were not actively seeking cotton. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41, staples 34 and longer, traded at around 500 to 550 points off NY May futures. Even-running lots of grades 31 and 41 commanded slightly higher prices. Domestic mill Purchases included a moderate volume for prompt delivery and a very buying was active. large quantity for October 1991 through July 1992 delivery. Reports indicated that a sizeable volume of 1991-crop cotton has been sold ahead for export but inquiries and purchases were very light during the week. Forward contracting of 1991-crop cotton by growers was active. Bale contracts were signed at around 550 points off NY December futures and acreage contracts at 600 to 700 points off, basis grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49. Rain and below normal temperatures halted land preparation in many localities.

Southwestern markets. Spot cotton trading was slow to inactive. Supplies remained limited. Prices remained steady. The few mixed lots that traded, brought around 2,000 to 2,500 points above CCC loan rates. A limited acreage was contracted in south and central Texas at 62 to 72 cents per pound, basis grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49 depending on dryland versus irrigated acreage and picker versus stripper harvested methods. Some premiums were paid for high strength varieties. Merchant interest in contracting west Texas and Oklahoma cotton remained weak. Much of the south Texas crop was up to a good stand, but strong winds and blowing sand were of some concern to producers. Strong winds and blowing sand continued in west Texas and southeast Oklahoma and soil moisture conditions were less than desirable. Scattered showers were received in some localities.

Western markets. Grower to merchant trading was inactive in the San Joaquin Valley (SJV). Domestic and Far Eastern mills purchased a small volume for nearby shipment. In the Desert Southwest (DSW), grower to merchant trading was inactive. Foreign mills purchased a small volume of cotton for nearby and prompt shipment. In the SJV, forward contracting of 1991 crop was at a standstill. In Arizona, growers booked a small acreage at 70 cents per pound, basis grade 31, staple 34. Wet fields hampered planting in many localities. American Pine trading was slow, even though demand was good. Small amounts of grade 3 traded an \$1.21 per pound and grade 4 at \$1.02. A limited acreage of 1991 crop was forward contracted at \$1.12 per pound, basis grade 3. Around 80 percent of the crop has been planted in Yuma County, Arizona, but some replanting will be necessary because of heavy rain and hail.

Textile mill. Domestic mill buying increased. Demand was good for a wide range of new crop qualities and delivery dates. Several mills bought a moderate volume for delivery from October 1991 through July 1992. Cotton for delivery through spring and early summer constituted only a small portion of purchases. Best demand was for grades 51 and higher, white and equivalent Light Spotted grades, staples 34 and longer, mike 35-49. Mill business remained steady. Sales of open end carded yarns and denims continued as best sellers. New sales of most other products remained slow to moderate. A few plants closed Easter week.

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<u>March prospective plantings</u>. Area planted to all cotton for 1991 is expected to total 14.0 million acres, 13 percent above 1990 and 32 percent above the 1989 planted area. Upland acreage is expected to total 13.8 million acres, up 13 percent from last year. Growers intend to reduce their plantings of American Pima cotton to 222 thousand acres, a 4 percent decrease from last year.

Upland growers in the Delta States (Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, and Tennessee) intend to plant 4.14 million acres. This is a 16 percent increase from 1990 and up 39 percent from two years ago.

Texas and Oklahoma producers intend to plant 6.88 million acres, a 15 percent increase from 1990. Planting has begun in the Rio Grande Valley and Coastal Bend. Land preparation is underway in other parts of Texas, but rain is needed in the High Plains to provide subsoil moisture. Six percent of the crop was seeded on March 24, which equalled last year's pace and only 1 percent behind average.

In the Southeast (Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina), planting intentions are estimated at 1.39 million acres up 26 percent from 1990. If realized, this region would have the largest percentage increase.

Upland planted acreage in the Western States (Arizona, California, and New Mexico) is expected to total 1.31 million acres, down 12 percent from last year. Cotton planting has begun in Arizona and by March 24, 5 percent of Arizona's crop had been planted, compared to 10 percent in 1990. Precipitation and low temperatures have delayed Arizona's plantings and precipitation caused fieldwork to progress slowly in California.

Upland cotton export sales. Net sales of 27,500 running bales, for the 1990-91 marketing year were off 25 percent during the week ending March 21, according to the Foreign Agricultural Service, USDA. The major purchasers were Canada with purchases of 12,700 bales, Indonesia 8,600, South Korea 7,700 and Taiwan 5,800 bales. Those purchases were partially offset by reductions of 18,100 bales for China. Sales increases for the 1991-92 marketing year of 43,000 bales were mainly for Indonesia with purchases of 17,900, South Korea 8,600 and Italy 7,800 bales. Exports of 169,200 bales were off 6 percent from the previous week. Asian destinations accounted for 75 percent of the week's shipments; West European 16 percent; and Western Hemisphere 9 percent.
