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Weekly Cotton Market Review

March 14, 1985

Room Trading was more active in California but continued to slow across the remainder of the Cotton Belt, according to the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Grower-held supplies were limited and offerings were light. Merchant demand was restricted primarily to cotton needed to fill prompt or nearby commitments. Domestic mill buying was a little more active but limited mostly to San Joaquin Valley, California, growth. Purchases included both 1984 and 1985-crop cotton. Export trading was slow and primarily with Far Eastern mills. Forward contracting of the 1985 crop was limited mostly to south Texas. Planting made good progress in south Texas, was under way in portions of the El Centro, California, area and was expected to begin in California's San Joaquin Valley and southern portions of central Texas in the next couple of weeks. Elsewhere, land preparation made good progress in most localities.

Spot cotton prices for grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49, in the designated markets averaged 59.59 cents per pound during the week ended Thursday, March 14. Prices ranged from a low of 58.88 cents on Monday to a high of 60.46 cents on Wednesday and ended the week at 60.07 cents. A week earlier, prices averaged 58.51 cents per pound and ranged from 58.01 to 58.75 cents. In the corresponding week last season, prices averaged 75.13 cents. The New York May 1985 futures settlement price ended the week on Thursday at 65.68 cents per pound compared with 64.38 cents a week earlier. The October settlement price was 65.02 cents against 64.62 cents last Thursday and the December price was 65.20 cents compared with 64.63 cents a week ago.

Trading was more active in California's San Joaquin Valley but continued to slow across most of the remainder of the Cotton Belt. Grower-held supplies and offerings were light in most markets but were adequate to meet merchant demand. Some growers rejected current prices and showed more interest in the CCC loan. Domestic mill buying was a little more active but restricted primarily to the San Joaquin Valley. Purchases included both 1984 and 1985-crop cotton. Export trading was light. Far Eastern mills made the bulk of purchases and wanted prompt or nearby shipment. Forward contracting of 1985-crop cotton by growers was restricted primarily to south Texas where a light volume was booked. chases reported by cotton exchanges in the designated markets totaled 61,100 bales in the week ended Thursday, March 14. This compares with 65,600 bales a week earlier and 97,800 bales reported in the corresponding week last season.

Textile mill report. Most mills have enough cotton to sustain current operations and buying remained light. Purchases were largely of southeastern and western growths, medium and higher grades, needed to augment existing stocks. Mills indicated that scheduling shipments to fit changing operating arrangements remains an ongoing problem. Quality of available cotton varies widely within some production areas, prompting some mills to seek needs from other localities. New orders for finished goods remained spotty and a number of mills maintained shortened work schedules to avoid inventory buildup. Sales of numerous apparel goods were mixed and yarn business was generally weak. In contrast, sportswear, underwear and medium weight apparel fabrics sold at a fair to good pace. operated three to five days per week.

World cotton supply and demand estimates. Projected world cotton production is up from a month earlier (see table on page 2). Crop forecasts for China, Pakistan and Peru are higher. Record crops are expected in China and Pakistan. Forecast global mill use and trade are near last month's estimates. Consumption is at a record level. With larger projected world output, this season's ending stocks forecast has been raised moderately. United States supply and demand forecasts are unchanged.
