

## Weekly Cotton Market Review



November 8, 1984

Spot cotton prices declined sharply, according to the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Trading was slow. Growers with uncommitted cotton were not offering freely at prevailing prices. Merchant demand was fairly good. Domestic mill buying was limited. Foreign mills purchased a light to moderate volume of cotton. Growers had forward contracted about 24 percent of the 1984 crop through the end of October. Harvesting made good progress in most localities and was past one-half completed in most states.

Spot cotton prices for grade 41 staple 34 , mike $35-49$, in the designated markets averaged 60.92 cents per pound during the week ended Thursday, November 8 . Prices ranged from a high of 61.78 cents on Friday to a low of 60.46 cents on Tuesday and ended the week at 60.72 cents. A week earlier, prices averaged 61.86 cents per pound and ranged from 61.08 to 62.84 cents. In the corresponding week a year ago, the average price was 74.00 cents. The New York December futures settlement price ended the week on Thursday at 65.63 cents per pound compared with 68.17 cents a week earlier. The October 1985 settlement price was 69.50 cents against 70.25 cents last Thursday.

Trading remained slow on spot cotton markets. Supplies of uncommitted cotton increased but most growers were unwilling to offer at prevailing prices. A considerable quantity of current ginnings was moving directly to merchants on forward contracts. Many merchants were filling nearby needs with contracted cotton and demand was very selective. Domestic mill purchases were light and mostly for prompt delivery. Far Eastern mills bought a light to moderate volume of cotton for prompt through April shipment. European mill purchases were light. Purchases reported by cotton exchanges in the designated markets totaled 88,500 bales in the week ended Thursday, November 8. This compares with 91,500 bales reported a week earlier and 324,600 bales in the corresponding week last season.

Textile mill report. Domestic mill purchases of cotton remained light. A few mills bought for fill-ins, mostly eastern and far western growths. Many mills were concerned about the quality of cotton picked after recent rains in the Mississippi Delta. Some mills were rejecting a large percentage of cotton currently being delivered against contracts made earlier in the year. Mill sales of finished goods were intermittent. Household and industrial fabrics continued to move fairly well. Apparel manufacturers reported a slowdown in goods' sales. Corduroy and denim continued to trade slowly. Printcloth, broadcloth and shirting were selling fairly well. Underwear, sheets and towels traded intermittently but demand was not steady. Mills continued to reduce work schedules in an effort to balance production with sales. Some mills closed for a week to adjust inventories and one major mill chain reportedly closed several older plants, possibly permanently.

Contracting 1984 crop. United States upland cotton growers had forward contracted about 24 percent of the 1984 crop by the end of October. This was the largest percentage booked by the end of October since the 1980 crop and was up from 16 percent a year earlier and 12 percent two years ago. Growers in southeastern states had contracted 33 percent of their crop this season, up from 27 percent last year. In south central states, growers had booked 32 percent, up from 25 percent the previous year. Growers in western states had contracted 25 percent of their acreage against 28 percent in 1983. Growers in southwestern states had contracted 19 percent, up from 6 percent a year earlier. American Pima cotton growers had forward contracted about 22 percent of their acreage by the end of October; 28 percent in Arizona, 23 percent in New Mexico and 7 percent in Texas. These estimates were based on the Crop Reporting Board's October acreage for harvest report and informal surveys made by the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA.

Upland cotton export sales. Activity increased during the week ended November 1 and resulted in net sales of 164,500 running bales, according to the Foreign Agricultural Service, USDA. The leading buyer was Japan with 73,500 bales followed by South Korea 28,400 , Indonesia 14,200 and West Germany 9,800 bales. Weekly exports of 86,400 bales exceeded the previous week's level by 10 percent. Asian destinations accounted for 81 percent of the week's shipments, Western Europe 16 percent and Western Hemisphere 3 percent.
