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Weekly Cotton Market Review (Week ended October 13)

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Spot cotton prices were fairly stable, according to the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Trading activity was limited mostly to southern markets. New-crop offerings continued to increase but remained light. Merchant demand remained limited. Domestic mills bought a light to moderate volume of cotton. Export trading was a little more active. Arizona growers continued to assess damages from recent heavy rains and flooding. Harvesting slowly increased in California, New Mexico, Oklahoma and on the Texas Plains. Rains interrupted harvesting in central Texas and most southern states. United States 1983 cotton production was forecast at 7.55 million bales.

<u>Spot cotton prices</u>. The average price for grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49 cotton, in the designated markets began the week on Friday, October 7, at 70.95 cents per pound. Prices moved within a range of 15 points or less every day during the week ended Thursday, October 13. The Thursday average price was 70.60 cents compared with 70.84 cents a week earlier and 59.54 cents on the corresponding Thursday last season. The New York December futures settlement price ended the week on Thursday at 76.73 cents per pound compared with 77.25 cents a week earlier.

<u>Trading</u> on spot cotton markets continued fairly active in the southern states but the volume traded was light. Grower-held supplies slowly increased as harvesting expanded. Many growers with available cotton were holding for higher prices. Demand was principally from merchants who were seeking cotton to cover nearby commitments. Domestic mill purchases were light to moderate and included cotton for both prompt and forward delivery. Foreign mill inquiries were more numerous and sales were made to both Far Eastern and European mills. Shipments were scheduled for prompt through July 1984. Purchases reported by cotton exchanges in the designated markets totaled 149,600 bales in the week ended Thursday, October 13. This compares with 104,700 bales a week earlier and 83,800 bales in the corresponding week last season.

Textile <u>mill report</u>. Domestic mill buying consisted of a light to moderate volume of cotton for both prompt and deferred delivery. Interest continued to improve for grades 31 and higher new-crop cotton. Where spot shortages occurred, mills covered their needs with gin-direct shipments or from other mills. Reports indicate rejections were running high on some direct delivery purchases. Cotton shipments were arriving from Texas and beginning to be received from central belt localities. Mill operating schedules of five to six-day weeks reflected steady business. Sales of numerous products were booked through year's end but some gaps remain in first and second quarters of next year. Most apparel goods and all-cotton yarns continued to move well, while some cotton-synthetic blends and a few industrial constructions moved more slowly.

<u>All cotton production</u> in the United States was forecast at 7.55 million 480 pound net weight bales, 37 percent below 1982 production and 3 percent less than the September 1 forecast, according to the Crop Reporting Board, SRS, USDA. Upland production was forecast at 7.47 million bales, 37 percent less than last year. American Pima production was forecast at 84,000 bales, 15 percent below 1982.

Acreage for harvest was estimated at 7.44 million acres, down 24 percent from last year. Average yield per harvested acre was forecast at 487 pounds, 103 pounds below 1982.

Production in the southeastern states -- Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina -- was forecast at 412,000 bales, down 57 percent from last year and 6 percent below the September 1 forecast. Early September rains came too late to significantly benefit the crop. Harvesting was about 15 percent finished by October 1.

In the Delta states -- Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri and Tennessee -growers expect to harvest 1.91 million bales, down 48 percent from 1982 and 5 percent less than last month's forecast. Mid-September rains were too late to improve yields. Favorable harvesting weather prevailed. Harvest was in full swing by October 1 with about 15 percent picked.

Upland production in Oklahoma and Texas was forecast at 2.41 million bales, down 18 percent from 1982 and 4 percent below the September 1 forecast. Harvesting progressed slowly with about 14 percent finished by October 1. Defoliation was active on the Rolling Plains. Freezing temperatures on September 21 damaged cotton on the northern High Plains. Some low yielding acreage was abandoned in Oklahoma.

In the western states -- Arizona, California and New Mexico -- upland production was forecast at 2.72 million bales, 36 percent less than last year and was unchanged from the September 1 forecast. Defoliation was interrupted by rains the last week of September in the San Joaquin Valley. Harvesting was just beginning. Extensive crop damage and some loss of acreage from flooding occurred in Arizona the first week of October. Damage was heaviest in Graham, Pima and Pinal Counties. This report was based on production prospects as of October 1. Effects of early October damage will be reflected in the November forecast.

The Bureau of the Census reported 769,632 running bales ginned prior to October 1, compared with 1,529,044 bales ginned to the same date last year.
