# UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE 

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Weekly Cotton Market Review
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Spot cotton prices trended higher, according to the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Trading of 1984 and 1985 -crop equities was light but was fairly active for 1986 crop. Merchant demand remained good. Domestic and foreign mill buying continued fairly active. Limited harvesting has begun in several states but was interrupted by rains. Hot, dry weather is needed to mature the crop. Harvesting was virtually completed in south Texas but some gins were still operating from stored seed cotton. Total export shipments for the 1985-86 season were the smallest since $1943-44$. The carryover of all kinds of cotton in the United States on August 2, 1986, totaled $9,044,561$ running bales, the largest since 1967.

Spot cotton prices for grade 41 staple 34 , mike $35-49$, in the designated markets averaged 27.42 cents per pound during the week ended Friday, August 29. Prices ranged from a low of 27.18 cents on Monday to a high of 27.84 cents on Friday. A week earlier, prices averaged 26.98 cents and ranged from 26.87 to 27.12 cents. The New York October 1986 futures settlement price ended the week on Friday at 35.28 cents per pound compared with 33.78 cents a week earlier. The December settlement price was 36.28 cents against 34.83 cents a week earlier.

Trading. A light volume of 1984 and 1985 -crop CCC loan equities continued to trade. Lower qualities were in best demand but little remains uncommitted. Inter-merchant trading of equity cotton accounted for much of the activity as merchants attempted to cover prompt and nearby commitments. Redemption of cotton from the CCC loan by shippers moved at a rapid pace. A light to moderate volume of 1986 -crop equities sold. CCC cotton certificates continued to trade readily at prices ranging from 98 to 102 percent of face value. Domestic mills bought a light to moderate volume of cotton for prompt through August 1987 delivery. Export trading continued at an active pace. Sales were primarily to Far Eastern mills. Purchases reported by cotton exchanges in the designated markets totaled 103,900 bales in the week ended Friday, August 29 . This compares with 93,900 bales reported a week earlier and 46,800 bales in the corresponding week last season.

Textile mill report. A few mills were actively in the market but overall buying was light to moderate. Demand included a fairly wide range of grades but centered on the medium and lower qualities, central and western growths, for nearby and later shipment. Mill inquiries increased for September and later delivery. Orders for textile products remained good with numerous items booked into first quarter months. Apparels, sales yarn and a wide variety of household products remained good sellers. Industrial and automotive product sales were also steady to good. Mills continued to work full to extended schedules.

Exports of cotton from the United States in July declined to the lowest level of the 198586 marketing year, according to the Bureau of the Census, Industry Division. July shipments of 25,300 running bales were the smallest for this month since 1942 and were down from 61,600 bales shipped a month earlier and 251,600 bales in July last season.

Shipments during the 1985-86 marketing year (August-July) totaled 1,874,600 bales, the smallest volume since the $1943-44$ season. Total exports this marketing year were down sharply from $5,943,000$ bales shipped during $1984-85$ and $6,418,700$ bales during the 1983-84 season.

The carryover of all kinds of cotton in the United States totaled 9,044,561 running bales on August 2, 1986, according to a preliminary report by the Bureau of the Census. This compares with $4,087,916$ bales a year earlier and $2,905,976$ bales two years ago. Cotton in consuming establishments totaled 770,814 bales on August 2 this year, up from 732,674 bales the previous year. Stocks in public storage totaled $8,123,747$ bales, up from $2,930,242$ bales a year ago. This season's carryover included an estimated 150,000 bales of cotton "elsewhere."

The supply of all kinds of cotton in the United States totaled $17,180,435$ running bales in the 1985-86 season, according to the Bureau of the Census. This compares with a supply of $15,378,539$ bales in the previous season. Stocks on hand at the beginning of the 198586 season totaled $4,087,916$ bales, ginnings August 1, 1985-July 31, 1986 totaled $13,064,487$ bales and net imports of foreign cotton amounted to 28,032 bales.

The disappearance of all kinds of cotton (domestic consumption plus exports) in the United States tocaled $8,062,293$ running bales, according to the Bureau of the Census. This was down from $11,210,752$ bales a year earlier. Disappearance in 1985-86 included 6,187, 693 bales used by domestic mills and exports of $1,874,600$ bales. A year earlier, domestic mills used $5,267,752$ bales and exports totaled $5,943,000$ bales.

## SUPPLY AND DISTRIBUTION OF DQMESTIC AND FOREIGN COTTON IN THE UNITED STATES: SEASON OF 1985 to 1986

The figure on the cotton "carryover" in the United States as of August 2, 1986, is 9,044,561 bales, according to the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. (Linters are not included.) In addition to stocks of cotton in warehouses and consuming establishments, this count includes a partially eatimated figure of cotton held elsewhere. Running bales, except imported cotton which is in equivalent 480 pound bales.

Upland cotton export sales during the week ended August 21 resulted in a net increase of $\overline{169,000}$ running bales, according to the Foreign Agricultural Service, USDA. Major buyers were Taiwan with 49,000 bales and Japan 39,800 bales. Exports for the week totaled 104, 700 bales, up 7 percent from the previous week. Asian destinations accounted for 79 percent of the week's shipments, West European 18 percent and Western Hemisphere 3 percent.

Spot prices are in cents per pound for cotton equal to the official Standards with mike readings of 35 thru 49 , nec weight, in mixed lots, uncompressed, free of all charges in warehouse in the market. Quotations are the average value of spot cotton in each market and may or may not represent actual trades in each quality.
