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## Weekly Cotton Market Review

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Spot cotton quotations for grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49, in the designated markets averaged 74.97 cents per pound during the week ending Friday, August 31, according to the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Quotations averaged 47 points lower than the previous week. Daily average quotations ranged from a high of 75.68 cents on Monday, August 27, to a low of 74.34 cents on Friday, August 31. Spot cotton quotations averaged 74.50 cents a week earlier and 70.09 cents in the corresponding week a year ago. The New York October 1990 futures settlement price closed on Friday at 73.83 cents compared with 74.82 cents a week earlier. The December settlement price was 72.19 cents against 72.35 cents the previous week. Spot transactions reported in the designated markets totaled 15,497 bales during the week ended Friday, August 31. This compares with 6,303 bales the previous week and 9,023 bales in the corresponding week last season.

Southeastern markets. Spot cotton trading was very light. Supplies of old-crop cotton have been exhausted and only a light volume of new crop has been ginned. Merchant demand was weak for most offerings, as most current needs were being filled from stocks. Demand continued best for grades 51, 42 and higher, staples 34 and longer, mike 35-49, and in mixed lots of these qualities. Grade 41 brought around 150 points on NY October futures. Contracting of 1990 crops remained light. Prices offered were around 150 to 300 points off NY December futures in North Carolina and Georgia to 350 to 450 points off in Alabama. Hot, dry weather conditions hastened maturity of the crop. Harvesting and ginning were slowly getting underway.

South central markets. Spot trading was a little more active. In mixed lots, grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49, sold at prices ranging from 100 points off to 50 points on NY October futures. Even-running lots of grades 31 and 41 commanded higher prices. A small volume of 1990-crop cotton, mostly grade 31 staples 35 and longer, mike 35-49, traded at about 150 points on NY October futures. Domestic mill buying increased sharply. The large volume of sales was for prompt through July 1991 delivery. Export trading was light and primarily with Far Eastern mills for prompt shipment. European mills made inquiries for high grade cotton for prompt through December shipment. Growers forward contracted a small volume of 1990-crop cotton at 550 points off NY December futures, basis grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49. The cotton crop was nearing maturity. Defoliation and harvesting were underway in some localities.

Southwestern markets. Trading activity centered on the south Texas crop. Merchants accepted delivery of contracted cotton and were offering 400 points off to even NY October futures for mixed lots of free cotton. Demand was weak for cotton stapling 30 and shorter, for mike 50 and higher, and/or strength of 23 grams per tex and below. Cotton with strength below 24 grams per tex was discounted two to four cents per pound. Merchants contracted a limited volume of 1991-crop south Texas cotton at 65.00 to 67.00 cents for grade 41 staple 34, mike 35-49. Very little Plains area spot cotton traded during the week as supplies were very limited. A light volume of the high Plains 1990-crop was contracted at 1,700 to 1,800 points above CCC loan rates. The cotton crop continued to make good progress as weather conditions remained ideal. Light to heavy insect infestations increased in some areas, requiring more spraying.

Western markets. Spot trading was slow. Grower supplies were very light. Domestic mills purchased a light to moderate volume of cotton from the San Joaquin Valley and Desert Southwest for prompt and nearby shipment. San Joaquin Valley growers forward contracted a light volume of 1990-crop cotton at 80 to 80.50 cents, and 1991 crop at 75 cents per pound, basis grade 31 staple 35, mike 35-49. Arizona growers forward contracted a small amount of 1990 crop at 74 cents, basis grade 31 staple 34. The cotton crop made normal progress. Harvesting was getting underway in a few localities. Demand was good for American Pima and trading was slow. Grade 3 staples 44 and 46, mike 35-49 brought around \$1.14 to \$1.15 per pound. Grade 4 brought \$1.05. Domestic mills purchased a small amount of cotton for last quarter or earlier shipment. Arizona growers forward contracted a light volume at \$1.17 to \$1.18 per pound, basis grade 3.

Textile mill report. Domestic mill buying was slightly more active. Several mills made inquiries and purchased a small volume of cotton for fall 1990 through second quarter 1991. A few mills also made around the clock purchases running through third quarter 1991. Central and southeastern growths were in best demand, but western growths also attracted some interest. Mill business slowed, but remained fairly good for most products. Ring spun yarn, lightweight blended apparel fabric, and household goods remained slow sellers. Athletic wear, most knits and plied yarn continued to sell well. Production was reduced at selected mills, and some mills closed for the entire Labor Day week. Workweeks were mostly five to seven days, but an increasing number dropped weekend shifts.

<u>Prices received by farmers</u> for upland cotton averaged 65.00 cents per pound in mid August, according to the National Agricultural Statistics Service, USDA. This compares with 62.90 for the entire month of July and 60.20 cents in August 1989. These prices include cotton delivered against forward contacts.

Forward contracting of 1990-crop cotton. Upland cotton growers in the United States had booked about 28 percent of their 1990 crop. This was up from 24 percent the previous month, but down from 32 percent a year ago. Contracting has been most active in the western states where about 46 percent of the crop was under contract by the end of August and compares with 60 percent a year earlier. In the southeastern states, about 42 percent of the crop had been booked, up from 31 percent in 1989. In the south central states, about 32 percent of the crop had been forward contracted, up from 31 percent a year ago. Growers in the southwestern states contracted about 17 percent, compared with 23 percent in 1989. These estimates were based on the Agricultural Statistics Board's August harvested acreage report and informal surveys made by the Cotton Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA.

## SUPPLY AND DISTRIBUTION OF DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN COTTON IN THE UNITED STATES: SEASON OF 1989 TO 1990

The figure on the cotton "carryover" in the United States as of July 29, 1989, is 6,984,564 bales, according to the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. (Linters are not included.) In addition to stocks of cotton in warehouses and consuming establishments, this count includes a partially estimated figure of cotton held elsewhere. Running bales, except imported cotton which is in equivalent 480 pound bales.

Upland cotton export sales. Net sales of 157,000 running bales during the week ending August 23, were down 12 percent from the previous week, according to the Foreign Agricultural Service, USDA. The major buyers were Japan with purchases of 37,800 bales, South Korea 35,500, Brazil 19,300 and Taiwan 18,400 bales. Cancellations of 8,800 bales were reported for Iraq. Shipments of 101,900 bales were 38 percent above the prior week. Asian destinations accounted for 86 percent of the week's exports; West European 12 percent and Western Hemisphere 2 percent. American Pima sales of 13,600 running bales were primarily to Japan with purchases of 12,500 bales. Shipments of 10,400 bales were mainly to Italy 3,000, West Germany 2,500, Indonesia 2,000, Japan 1,200 and South Korea 1,100 bales.
