t Texas Tech University, Agricultural Communicators of Tomorrow (ACT) helps many different kinds of students prepare for the job hunt. The group is part of a national organization that can be found at universities with agricultural communications programs. Students of any major or background can join, and the group focuses on preparing members for their careers.

One of the main events ACT members attend is the Professional Development Conference, hosted by a member school. Texas Tech will host the conference in 2012. Agricultural Communications Campaigns, a capstone class that allows students to combine knowledge learned in multiple classes, is focused on the planning aspect of the upcoming conference.

Danielle White, senior in agricultural communications, is one of the students enrolled in the class.

"We are learning to plan a campaign from start to end," White said. "We started out with the event planning aspect of it and are going to move on to marketing the event, which is the 2012 ACT Professional Development Conference."

White said students in the class are in charge of marketing, which includes the creation of a website, printed materials, and social media initiatives. Each student submits a proposal and collectively the group decides what to implement.

"Knowing that you came up with an idea that is good enough to be put into place is really cool. It's an experience to take when applying for jobs," White said. "It gives students the experience of planning and marketing an event from start to finish, and is something that employers can respect."

Adeline Fox, junior in agricultural communications, and 2010-2011 president of Texas Tech's ACT chapter, stresses the importance of conference attendance.
