Making Service Learning Meaningful and Effective

The state of Maryland has long-term success with service learning in the public schools. The following have been adapted from Maryland's Best Practices for Service Learning, and can become a part of any service learning in any state. Service-learning projects allow students and teachers to:

1. Meet a recognized need in the community

Students work as a team to identify vital community needs and plan, participate, and implement projects that address those needs. These community needs are related to health, education, environment, and public safety.

2. Achieve curricular objectives while performing service learning

Service learning presents opportunities for classroom knowledge to be applied and implemented in real-life settings.

3. Reflect on the experience

Reflection activities, such as discussions, journaling, role-playing, or writing, provide students with the ability to connect curriculum learning to the service being provided.

4. Develop student responsibility, critical thinking, and decision-making skills

Students learn teamwork, problem solving, time and energy management, as well as, leadership skills when they own the service learning.

5. Establish community and business partnerships

Networking with community and business professionals provide students with ideas for career possibilities and the opportunity to work with diverse individuals.

6. Plan

Using the LEADERS Model of Service or the FCCLA Planning Process provides students the opportunities to plan and collaborate in order to implement service-learning projects and showcase the knowledge through marketing and competitive events.

7. Equip students with knowledge and skills needed for service

Research and understanding of an issue must be completed in order for students to effectively engage in a service-learning project. Students learn project specific skills, practice citizenship, and civic engagement.
