Clinical Course Responsibilities

In addition to the provision of reading material and didactic instruction, responsibilities for practicum includes intensive and predominantly live individual and group supervision of doctoral MFT students, evaluation of student progress, assignment and monitoring of cases seen within the Family Therapy Clinic. Responsibilities for internship, though primarily administrative in terms of facilitating student placements, involved monitoring intern hours and training, ensuring that established program policies relevant to the internship requirement were fulfilled, and included clinical supervision of interns. Supervision of doctoral interns was conducted on site and in conjunction with agency staff.

Course Development

Organized first offering of the MFT internship course and served as the original director of internship training for the MFT program. Developed course requirements and related program policies, identified and recruited potential placement agencies, constructed assessment and feedback instruments, and created procedures to facilitate student placements and monitoring. Developed advanced doctoral seminar examining gender in couple and family therapy. Identified salient course content and learning objectives, constructed syllabus and class activities, and offered course as an elective to interested students. Developed first offering of an MFT intermediate research course that began Spring 2000.
