English Language Arts and Reading, Grade 8 - Semester A

Course Information

ELAR 8A is the first semester of this two-semester course.

The main themes of ELAR 8A are heroes and societies and how these are represented in many types of writing. Reading gives you a chance to think about why people behave the way they do, why societies have certain rules, and reflect on what could be different in the world.

ELAR 8A uses journaling activities to help you improve your reading skills so you can get more out of your encounters with various texts. These activities also prepare you for bigger assignments where you turn in a chart, an essay plan, or a complete essay.

There are four main writing assignments with two in each unit. You'll work on these major assignments a little bit at a time while you look at helpful examples of this type of writing in the textbook.

- 3. use textual evidence, use new vocabulary words, reflect on the ideas of others, and make connections among texts, ideas, and experiences;
- 4. analyze author's craft through a variety of genres and mimic features and styles in their own formal and informal writing;
- 5. answer text-dependent questions at varying levels; and
- 6. demonstrate writing skills and grammar knowledge through a creative writing, writing that defines, informational writing, and argumentative writing.

Course Credit

The course grade will be calculated as follows:

- 50% coursework average;
- 50% summative assessment average, including the final exam;
- A passing course grade is 70 or higher.

Students must attempt all assignments in the course. The final exam will not be available until all assignments have been accepted and graded by the teacher.

Students who score below 70% on the final exam will be eligible for one re-exam opportunity.

Coursework

The graded assignments within each lesson are formative in nature. This means that they are designed to assist you in applying and demonstrating the lesson concepts, as well as identifying areas in which you need additional review. You may use all the lesson's learning activities to assist you as you complete the graded assignments.

Summative Assessments

Summative assessments are those that allow you to demonstrate mastery of the course objectives. For summative assessments, you will NOT be allowed to use the learning materials. These are opportunities for you to show what you have learned by that point in the course.

Summative assessments may be proctored using the online proctoring system Proctorio. Information about Proctorio is provided in **Remote Proctoring** in the Syllabus section of your course. The summative assessments for this course are as follows:

Course Completion

Computer Problems

A working computer is necessary for online coursework. Computer problems will not be accepted as a valid reason for failure to complete course activities within the allotted

Server Problems

When the Blackboard server needs to be taken down for maintenance, the Blackboard administrator will post an announcement in your course informing you of the time and date. If the server experiences unforeseen problems, your course instructor will notify you.

Lost or Corrupted Files

You must keep/save a copy of every project/assignment on an external disk or personal computer. In the event of any kind of technology failure (e.g., Blackboard server crash or virus infection, students' own computer problems, loss of files in cyberspace, etc.) or any disputes, the instructor may request or require you to resubmit the files. In some instances, the instructor may need to open another attempt within Blackboard, so communication with your instructor is critical in these circumstances.
