

From the Academic Council Minutes - April 26, 1983

## Announcements

1. Phil Befa Kappa has indicated it did not accept Tech's applidation for conkideration for the next triennium. This society noted that some 76 applications for consideration had been received.
2. There was lengthy discussion of admission and retention polidies. The Council recommended establishment of higher admission standards to begin with Fall, 1984 which would include, for beginning freshmen: 4 units of English, 3 units of Mathematics, 2 units of Sciende, 2 1/2 units of Social Science, and $31 / 2$ units of electives. It was noted that sone exceptions may have to be made for those high school students who could not adjust their program in time to meet requirements for Fall, 1984.
The Counfil also recqmmended establishing increased SAT/ACT requirements for begjnning freshmen. Recommended SAT scores for non-conditional admissigns include for the highest quarter of the high school class rank - 10 minimum, second quarter - 900, third quarter - 1000 and fourth quarter - 1100. Students desiring admission who scone below these levels may be admitted on condition.
After sybstantial discussion a document on scholastic probation and suspension for undergraduates was referred to the Administrative Council for revjew. Salient points in the document include: Conditionally admitte students would be on scholastic probation for the term admitted, excluding the initial summer terms of enrollment (conditional students are urged to enter in the summer prior to their first fall enroliment). In addition, a cumulative GPA below 2.0 places a student on probdtion; maintenance of semester 2.0 or above allows one to continue on probotion (two summer terms count as one semester). For probationary students, semester and cumulative GPA's below 2.0 result in scholastic suspension. First suspensions would be for one semester and a subsequent suspension would be for at least two semesters.
Much of the discussion centered around whether graduation requirements should include a minimum cumulative 2.0 average for all courses attempted in the degree program in which the student seeks graduation, including repeated courses. Further consideration of the Administrative Council on this point was sought.
3. The annquncement of Dr. Richard Ishler to become Dean of the follege of Education effective September 1, 1983 was made by Dr. Darling.

1. Announcements
a. Latest salary estimates from the Legislature are now dow to $4.5 \%$ for the first and $5.7 \%$ for the second year of the bennium.

2．A packe of materials concerning academic standards for admission and retention was distributed．This material included statistics on the number of students admitted provisionally，a comparison of sample admissign plans，the percent of freshmen that would be admitted con－ ditionally，policy and procedures at other state universities，and a summany of freshmen grades showing the percentage with GPA under 2．00．This item will be placed on the next agenda and it is requested that evgryone come to the meeting with an idea on whether or hot the changes should be approved．

3．Dr．J．Knox Jones distributed and discussed a recent study copcerning the recruitment of graduate students．This recruitment is ba⿰三丨⿰丨三⿻⿻一𠃋十一（cally done by individual academic programs with assistance，as requested， from the graduate school．A brochure for graduate education has been prepared and is available in quantity for distribution by academic units．

4．The colleges generality supported the concept of a requirement that university degree programs contain one or more hours of handston computing．The need to develop better understanding for such a require－ ment within some departments was cited，however，and deans are to proceed with this．Academic Affairs is willing to assistif requested

5．Computer registration is proceeding on target．Deans are to emind faculty to encourage students to register．The August 1,1981 deadline for payment of fees was discussed as a potential disincentive to regis－ tration，however，students in financial difficulty should be dounseled to seek student loans if necessary to cover the fee payment．A wrap－up and revikw of the registration process will be scheduled for an agenda after the fall semester starts so that these and other procedural matters hay be evaluated．

6．Council hembers are requested to have their staff and／or faculty review the student grievance policy；especially the paragraph concer ing handi－ capped sfudents．As a University，all colleges will need to insure that they are sensitive to the special needs of handicapped students and what services the Univers＇ty has to assist in those needs．At a later date， the office of Academic Affairs will provide more guidance on the special requirements needed by handicapped students in accordance with Department of Educafion directives under Section 504 of the Rehabilitatidn Act of 1973.

## From the Administrative Council Minutes－April 19， 1983

1．The Legislature is planning to approve utility funds at the $80 \%$ level of our uniyersity request for FY ＇ 84 ．This will necessitate conservation conscioysness by all the academic units．The Energy Usage and Conservation Committ problems．

2. Schedules for summer classes have been distributed to collegs and departments for advising purposes, but will not be distributed to \&udents until after advance registration for fall which is now underway, due to the confusion of old/new numbering systems. Early registration ip proceeding closely in line with projections and the total admitted freshnen are running approximately $15 \%$ ahead of this time last year. Open registration will start May 9 and will provide time to clean up the system with drops, adds and required schedule changes. Faculty who have been engaged in the advising process are to be complimented for the fine job they have done.

2. Wrote letters notifying faculty members of results of election to various positions of responsibility.

4. Wrote letters inviting new Senators to the May meeting and thanking retiring Senators.
5. Sent budget information from Vice President Ramsey's office to Budget Study Committee Chlairman Freeman.
6. Notified Vice President Darling of results of elections.

MOTION: A proc\&dure for election of the Faculty Grievance Panel under the new Faculty Grievance Procedure shall proceed as follows:

1. Nominations will be solicited from each college including the School of Law for 2 members and an alternate.
