Dr. Gebreyes is a Hazel C. Youngberg Distinguished Professor and Executive Director of the Global One Health initiative (GOHi) at The Ohio State University. He was elected to the National Academy of Medicine (NAM). He recently completed a one-year higher education leadership fellowship as part of the renowned American Council on Education (ACE). During his fellowship at the Office of President, Michigan State University, he actively participated in the MSU 2030 strategic plan implementation steering committee. Dr. Gebreyes has been actively engaged in innovative financing for university capital investment. He was also engaged in crises management, serving on the COVID-19 executive committee, and broader change management activities including innovative university/industry partnership. Dr. Gebreyes was inducted as inaugural member of the National Academy of International Education and serves as its Vice Chair. He has led programs funded through the NIH, CDC, USAID, Gates Foundation, CDC Foundation, and RESOLVE to Save Lives. He serves in national and international advisory capacities for various governments and entities including Brazil CAPES, Ethiopian Ministry of Science and Higher Education and on review panels in Austria, Poland, and Qatar among others.

Dr. Gebreyes co-founded the International Congress on Pathogens at the Human Animal Interface (ICOPHAI) in 2011 anticipating the need for knowledge-sharing against future pandemics and currently serves as Chairperson. Malone International Leadership Award; NIH Gold Medallion; Universitas 21 Best Internationalization Model; NC State University Distinguished Alum; Andrew Heiskell Award (honorable mention) by the Institute of International Education (IIE).

Latz is broadly interested in the internationalization of higher education in the United States and Asia. His research career has focused on comparative study of regional development and resource management policy

Sukant Misra

Dr. Sukant Misra is a professor in the Agricultural & Applied Economics department. He was the Associate Vice Provost and then the Vice Provost for International Affairs at Texas Tech University from 2014 to 2022, with responsibilities to provide oversight of international education, research, and outreach functions of the University. Before that, he served as the Associate Dean for Research for the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources

(CASNR) from 2002 to 2014. He has served the College and Texas Tech University in various faculty and administrative capacities since his initial employment in 1993. Beyond his service to the college and university, he has served in several local, state, regional, and national positions with professional organizations involved in the advancement of the agricultural and natural resource industries.

He received his Bachelor and Master's degrees in Analytical and Applied Economics from Utkal University, India, in 1979 and 1981, respectively. He obtained a second Master of Science degree in 1986 and his doctorate in Agricultural Economics in 1989, both from Mississippi State University.

Misra has experience in managing and coordinating many large, faculty-driven, research programs and international initiatives and has many contacts at international institutions, including leading universities in Brazil, China, Costa Rice, Czech Republic, Ethiopia, India, Mexico, Romania, Tajikistan, and Turkey. Misra has visited over 25 countries and has worked closely with faculty and administration of many international institutions.



Reagan Ribordy

Director of International Programs Office of International Affairs

Reagan Ribordy is the Senior Director of International Programs in the Office of International Affairs at Texas Tech University. In this role, she oversees the International Grants Administration and Partnerships division. This division was created to facilitate the

development of multi-investigator, multi-disciplinary international research and development programs at Texas Tech University. The Grants Administration unit works with faculty to identify and disseminate international research and development grant opportunities, and to help develop and submit large, multi-disciplinary proposals to funding agencies. Additionally, this division facilitates the development of all agreements with international partners for Texas Tech University. As Senior Director of International Programs, Ms. Ribordy is responsible for strategic planning and oversight of personnel administration for the Office of International Affairs. In 2021, Ms. Ribordy was a recipient of the Top Techsan Award through the Texas Tech Alumni Association and a recipient of the Phenomenal Women of Texas Tech University through the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.



Dr. Lawrence Schovanec

Dr. Lawrence Schovanec is the 17th president of Texas Tech University. Prior to his appointment he served as the university provost since December 2013 and was interim president from July 2012 through March 2013. He also served as the dean of the College of Arts & Sciences, and chair of the Department of Mathematics & Statistics.

Dr. Schovanec earned his doctorate in mathematics from Indiana University, his master's degree from Texas A&M University and a Bachelor of Science degree from Phillips University. Other than two appointments as a visiting professor at Texas A&M and a research fellow at the U.S. Air Force Astronautics Laboratory, Schovanec has spent his entire career at Texas Tech University. He has published primarily in the areas of biomechanical and physiological control systems and solid mechanics. He has spoken extensively at international conferences and other professional venues. As an administrator he has been a strong advocate for educational and outreach activities in areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). In support of his research and STEM activities he has received more than \$3.2 million in external funding, primarily from the National Science Foundation.

Dr. Schovanec has received the President's Excellence in Teaching Award and is a member of the Texas Tech Teaching Academy. In 2011, he was a recipient of the Texas Tech University Inclusive Excellence Award given by the Division of Institutional Diversity, Equity, and Community Engagement.



Dr. Kayse Shrum

Dr. Kayse Shrum is a pioneering leader in higher education in her native state of Oklahoma. A pediatric physician by trade, she was selected as the 19th president of the Oklahoma State University system and took office on July 1, 2021. She is the first woman to lead a public research university in Oklahoma.

During her first year as president of the five-campus OSU system, Shrum launched key initiatives and partnerships, such as the Hamm Institute for American Energy at Oklahoma State University and the Oklahoma Aerospace Institute for Research and Education (OAIRE), which will elevate OSU's reach and impact in the energy and aerospace fields.

Before being selected to lead the OSU system, Dr. Shrum served as president of the OSU Center for Health Sciences (OSU-CHS), becoming the youngest and first female president and dean of a medical school in Oklahoma. Under her leadership, student enrollment more than doubled as new academic programs were established to meet the state's health care workforce needs. A strong supporter of collaborative partnerships, Dr. Shrum worked with the Cherokee Nation to establish the nation's first tribally affiliated medical school — the OSU College of Osteopathic Medicine at the Cherokee Nation. She also helped secure a landmark investment from Purdue Pharma in the amount of \$197.5 million to create the National Center for Wellness and Recovery to address the opioid epidemic.

Dr. Shrum and her husband, Darren, are the parents of six children, including three boys they adopted from Ethiopia.



Ruth Ann Stevens-Klitz

Ruth Anne Stevens-Klitz currently serves as the Counselor for Public Affairs at U.S. Embassy Addis Ababa. Prior to arrival in Ethiopia, she was the Strategic Communications Coordinator for the Bureau of African Affairs. She joined the Foreign Service in 2000 and has served in Armenia, Israel, Germany, Morocco, and Egypt, in addition to Washington tours in the Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs. Ruth Anne speaks French, German, Arabic, and basic Russian.

Her professional passions are leadership, intercommunity dialogue, and strategic communications.

Ruth Anne is married to Tim Klitz, a former OMS and full-time dad, and has three children. She received her BSFS in Regional and Comparative Studies from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service and her MA in Strategic Studies from the U.S. Army War College in Carlisle, PA. She is originally from Cleveland, Ohio.



Dan Whitman

As Foreign Service Officer, Dan Whitman was posted in Denmark, Spain, South Africa, Haiti, Cameroon. He briefly served in Ghana, Guinea, and Nigeria, South Sudan, Mauritius, Gambia, Equatorial Guinea, and Congo-Brazzaville.

He taught Foreign Policy and other courses at American University 2009-2020, and currently is at George Washington University. He is Senior Fellow, Foreign Policy Research Institute.

Whitman began his public diplomacy work in 1969, when he was the assigned French interpreter for an African visitor under the International Visitors Program of the U.S. Information Agency. Since then he accompanied African and French visitors in the IV program for a thirteen year period, then planned programs for IVs at Delphi Research Associates. He was a Fulbright scholar in 1980-81 in Brazzaville, after earning his PhD at Brown University in 1979.

Whitman is author *A Haiti Chronicle*, documenting the three Haitian elections of 2000. His oral history of educational and cultural exchanges between apartheid South Africa and the United States was published in 2014 by the SUNY Press.





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
