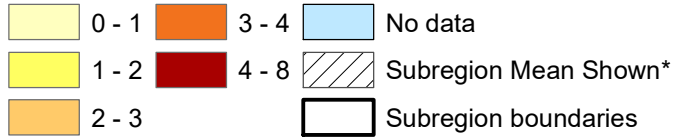
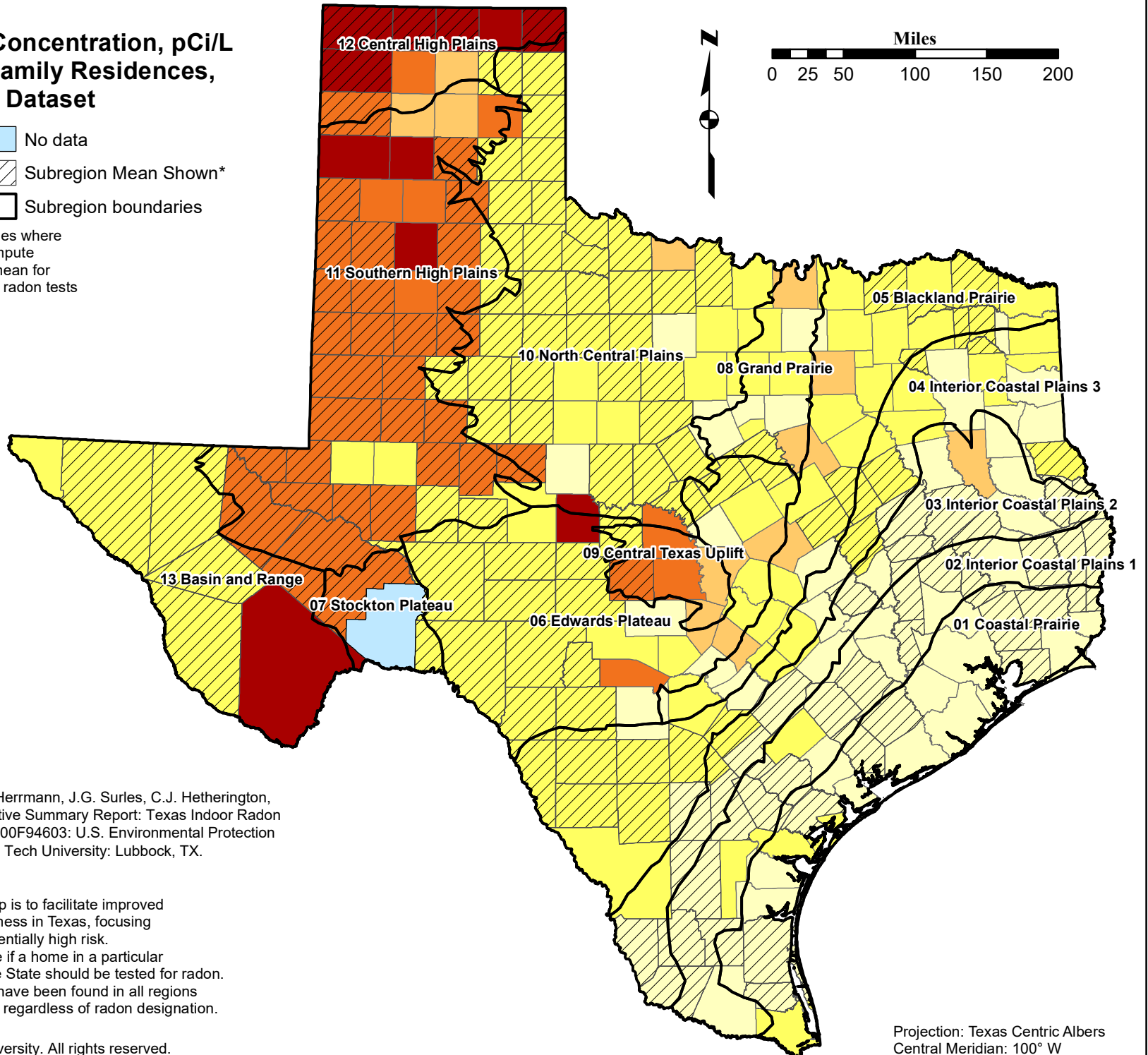


# Mean Indoor Radon Concentration, pCi/L First Floor, Single Family Residences, 2020 AEL Dataset

This map is not intended to determine if a home in a particular county or physiographic region of the State should be tested for radon. Homes with elevated levels of radon have been found in all regions of Texas. All homes should be tested, regardless of radon designation.
