§113.43. World Geography Studies (One Credit), Beginning with School Year 2011-2012.					
(a) General requirements. Students shall be awarded one unit of credit for successful					
completion of this course.					
(b) Introduction.					
(1) In World Geography Studies, students examine people, places, and environments at local, regional, national, and international scales from the spatial and ecological perspectives					
of geography. Students describe the influence of geography on events of the past and present					
with emphasis on contemporary issues. A significant portion of the course centers around the					
physical processes that shape patterns in the physical environment; the characteristics of					
major landforms, climates, and ecosystems and their interrelationships; the political,					
economic, and social processes that shape cultural patterns of regions; types and patterns of					
settlement; the distribution and movement of the world population; relationships among people, places, and environments; and the concept of region. Students analyze how location					
affects economic activities in different economic systems. Students identify the processes that					
influence political divisions of the planet and analyze how different points of view affect the					
development of public policies. Students compare how components of culture shape the					
characteristics of regions and analyze the impact of technology and human modifications on					
the physical environment. Students use problem-solving and decision-making skills to ask and answer geographic questions.					
(2) To support the teaching of the essential knowledge and skills, the use of a variety of rich					
primary and secondary source material such as contemporary and historic maps of various					
types, satellite-produced images, photographs, graphs, map sketches, and diagrams is					
encouraged.					
(3) The eight strands of the essential knowledge and skills for social studies are intended to					
be integrated for instructional purposes. Skills listed in the social studies skills strand in					
subsection (c) of this section should be incorporated into the teaching of all essential knowledge and skills for social studies. A greater depth of understanding of complex content					
material can be attained when integrated social studies content from the various disciplines					
and critical-thinking skills are taught together. Statements that contain the word "including"					
reference content that must be mastered, while those containing the phrase "such as" are					
intended as possible illustrative examples.					
(4) Students identify the role of the U.S. free enterprise system within the parameters of this course and understand that this system may also be referenced as capitalism or the free					
market system.					
(5) Throughout social studies in Kindergarten-Grade 12, students build a foundation in					
history; geography; economics; government; citizenship; culture; science, technology, and					
society; and social studies skills. The content, as appropriate for the grade level or course,					
enables students to understand the importance of patriotism, function in a free enterprise society, and appreciate the basic democratic values of our state and nation as referenced in					
the Texas Education Code (TEC), §28.002(h).					
(6) Students understand that a constitutional republic is a representative form of government					
whose representatives derive their authority from the consent of the governed, serve for an					
established tenure, and are sworn to uphold the constitution.					
(7) State and federal laws mandate a variety of celebrations and observances, including Celebrate Freedom Week.					
(A) Each social studies class shall include, during Celebrate Freedom Week as provided					
under the TEC, §29.907, or during another full school week as determined by the board of					
trustees of a school district, appropriate instruction concerning the intent, meaning, and					
importance of the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution, including the Bill of Rights, in their historical contexts. The study of the Declaration of Independence must					
include the study of the relationship of the ideas expressed in that document to subsequent					
American history, including the relationship of its ideas to the rich diversity of our people as					
a nation of immigrants, the American Revolution, the formulation of the U.S. Constitution,					
and the abolitionist movement, which led to the Emancipation Proclamation and the women's					
suffrage movement.
