ELAR 7B

English Language Arts and Reading, Grade 7 – Semester B

Course Information

ELAR 7B is the second semester of this two-semester course.

The main theme of ELAR 7B is about exploring the lives of others and the differences they make in the world. You'll do this by reading about both fictional characters and historical figures. You'll also take a close look at poetry and drama and work through a major research project.

ELAR 7B uses journaling activities to help you improve your reading skills so you can get more out of your encounters with various texts. These activities also prepare you for bigger assignments where you turn in an analysis chart, an essay plan, or a complete essay.

There are two units (Unit 3 and Unit 4) with a total of four main writing assignments, two in each unit. Each unit is broken into two parts (Units 3A, 3B, 4A, and 4B), with the first part working toward the first main writing assignment, and the second part working toward the second main writing assignment.

After completing this course, you should be able to:

- 1. ask questions of texts and observe genre characteristics and text structures;
- 2. use textual evidence, use new vocabulary words, and make connections among texts, ideas, and experiences;
- 3. analyze author's craft through a variety of genres and mimic features and styles in their own formal and informal writing;
- 4. answer text-dependent questions at varying levels; and
- 5. demonstrate writing skills and grammar knowledge through a literary analysis, biographical essay, poem, compare and contrast essay, and research report.

Course Credit

The course grade will be calculated as follows:

- 50% coursework average;
- 50% summative assessment average (for Units 3A, 3B, 4A, and 4B), including the final exam;
- A passing course grade is 70 or higher.

Students must attempt all assignments in the course. The final exam will not be available until all assignments have been accepted and graded by the teacher.

Students who score below 70% on the final exam will be eligible for one re-exam opportunity.

Coursework

The graded assignments within each lesson are formative in nature. This means that they are designed to assist you in applying and demonstrating the lesson concepts, as well as identifying areas in which you need additional review. You may use all the lesson's learning activities to assist you as you complete the graded assignments.

Summative Assessments

Summative assessments are those that allow you to demonstrate mastery of the course objectives. For summative assessments, you will NOT be allowed to use the learning materials. These are opportunities for you to show what you have learned by that point in the course.

Computer Problems

Lost or Corrupted Files

You must keep/save a copy of every project/assignment on an external disk or personal computer.
