Social Studies, Grade 7 (Texas History) v6.1 – Semester B

Course Information

SOCSG7-B is the second semester of this two-semester course.

In Texas History, students focus on the chronological traces across twelve major eras of Texas History. Beginning with the history of indigenous groups in the region before European contact, and ending with contemporary issues of concern in twenty-first-century Texas. Students analyze the causes and events of the Texas Revolution, evaluate the government and culture of the Republic of Texas, and examine the annexation debate and statehood process. This course examines Texas's role in the Confederacy and Civil War and identifies the effects of westward migration on American Indians and ranching culture. Students will analyze the Declaration of Independence, the U.S. Constitution, and the Bill of Rights, and examine their influence on American democracy and social movements.

Students develop skills in analyzing primary and secondary sources, evaluating historical causation and bias, and synthesizing multiple interpretations of historical events.

The topics included in this semester are:

1. Age of Oil and Reform
2. Texas in the 20th Century
3. Social, Political, and Economic Change
4. Contemporary Texas

Course Topics

After completing this course, the students should have increased knowledge of

1. analyze Texas geography, regions, and natural resources while understanding the major eras and significant dates that define Texas history;
2. develop skills in analyzing primary and secondary sources, evaluating historical causation and bias, and synthesizing multiple interpretations of historical events;
3. analyze the Declaration of Independence, U.S. Constitution, and Bill of rights and their influence on American democracy and social movements;
4. examine indigenous cultures and technologies before European contact, compare European exploration and colonization efforts, and analyze Mexico's independence and colonization of Texas;
5. analyze causes and events of the Texas Revolution, evaluate the government and culture of the Republic of Texas, and examine the annexation debate and statehood process; and
6. examine Texas's role in the Confederacy and Civil War, recognize Reconstruction's impact, including Juneteenth, and identify the effect of westward migration on American Indians and ranching culture.

The instructor will message the student or provide feedback on the assignment indicating the need to schedule a one-on-one video conference, during which the student will be required to demonstrate their skills or knowledge through an alternative or mutually agreed-upon assignment. The grade of the alternate or agreed upon assignment will be determined at the instructor's discretion with the highest possible score being 70%.

If it is determined that a student has violated final exam directions on Final Exam A or CBE Set 1, the exam will be scored as zero. The student may take Final Exam B or CBE Set 2 with the highest possible score being 70%.

The incident will be reported to Texas Tech K-12 Administration and documented in the student's file. Continued violations of Texas Tech University's Academic Integrity Policy will result in the removal of the student from the program.

You will be expected to log into the Canvas course regularly to be aware of possible announcements/reminders and to pace your student's progress in the course.
