English I, Grade 9 – Semester A

Course Information

ENG 1A is the first semester of this two-semester course.

English 1A focuses on reading and writing skills, building on what you've learned before and laying a foundation for more advanced work in future English courses. You'll read a variety of texts to think about author purpose, techniques and tools used, and how we use language and stories to convey meaning. You'll use what you learn in your own writing. Broadly speaking, this course covers:

- narrative, argumentative, persuasive, and informational writing;
- editing skills, with particular emphasis on the use of commas and pronoun-antecedent agreement;
- research skills and the research process, including how to evaluate and cite sources as well as how to effectively integrate various media into writing; and
- textual elements that give clues to the author's purpose, such as structural choices, theme, imagery, symbolism, word choice, and so on.

4. write effective essays in a variety of styles and modes; and
5. apply editing skills to make revisions to your own and others' writing.

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Course Credit

The course grade will be calculated as follows:

- 50% coursework average;
- 50% summative assessment average (for Units 1-6), including the final exam;
- A passing course grade is 70 or higher.

Students must attempt all assignments in the course. The final exam will not be available until all assignments have been accepted and graded by the teacher.

Students who score below 70% on the final exam will be eligible for one re-exam opportunity.

Coursework

The graded assignments within each lesson are formative in nature. This means that they are designed to assist you in applying and demonstrating the lesson concepts, as well as identifying areas in which you need additional review. You may use all the lesson's learning activities to assist you as you complete the graded assignments.

Summative Assessments

Summative assessments are those that allow you to demonstrate mastery of the course objectives. For summative assessments, you will NOT be allowed to use the learning materials. These are opportunities for you to show what you have learned by that point in the course.
