

Chris Jenks

Chris Jenks is the Senior Law of War Advisor for the U.S. Army Judge Advocate General (JAG) Corps and a Professor of Law at the SMU Dedman School of Law in Dallas, Texas. He is also a Senior Fellow at West Point's Lieber Institute for Law and Warfare, a Council Member at the International Institute of Humanitarian Law in Sanremo, Italy, and a member of the American Law Institute.



Previously, he served as the Senior International Humanitarian Law (IHL) Advisor at the Office of Global Criminal Justice in the Department of State. He has also been a Resident Fellow at the Center for Autonomy and Artificial Intelligence at the Center for Naval Analysis and served as Special Counsel to the General Counsel for the Department of Defense.

Professor Jenks has appeared before an International Criminal Court Appeals Chamber and has been recognized as a law of war expert by a U.S. Federal District Court. He has presented at a United Nations meeting on autonomous weapons and was a member of the U.S. delegation at several sessions. Additionally, he represented the United States during one of the UN's Sixth Committee sessions on the International Law Commission's Draft Articles on the Prevention and Punishment of Crimes Against Humanity.

Professor Jenks served twenty years in the U.S. Army, initially as an Infantry officer and later as a Judge Advocate. He participated in operational deployments to Kuwait, Bosnia as part of the initial NATO peacekeeping force, and to Mosul, Iraq. In his final military assignment, he was the chief of the Army's international law branch.

A Fulbright Senior Scholar, Professor Jenks holds LLM degrees from Georgetown Law and the Army JAG School, a JD from the University of Arizona College of Law, and a B.S. from the United States Military Academy.
