Eric Talbot Jensen

Eric Talbot Jensen is the Robert W. Barker Professor of Law at Brigham Young University Law School. He specializes in Public International Law, Criminal Law, the Law of Armed Conflict, International Criminal Law, Cyber Law, and National Security Law. His recent scholarship has been published in various prestigious journals, including the Texas, Temple, Houston, and Israel Law Reviews, as well as the Virginia, Stanford, Chicago, Michigan, and Minnesota Journals of International Law.



Professor Jensen is a co-author of a law school casebook on the Law of Armed Conflict and a student treatise on National Security Law published by Aspen Publishing. He has also co-authored an Oxford University text that analyzes the application of the laws of war to the war on terror. Furthermore, he was a member of the expert group that produced both the Tallinn Manual on the International Law Applicable to Cyber Warfare and the recent Tallinn Manual 2.0 on the International Law Applicable to Cyber Operations.

During 2016-2017, Professor Jensen served as the Special Counsel to the Department of Defense General Counsel. Before joining the BYU law faculty in 2011, he spent two years teaching at Fordham Law School in New York City. He also had a 20-year career in the United States Army, where he served as both a Cavalry Officer and a Judge Advocate. His roles as a Judge Advocate included Chief of the Army's International Law Branch, Deputy Legal Advisor for Task Force Baghdad, Professor of International and Operational Law at The Judge Advocate General's Legal Center and School, legal advisor to the US contingent of UN Forces deployed to Skopje, Macedonia, as part of UNPREDEP, and legal advisor in Bosnia in support of Operation Joint Endeavor/Guard.
