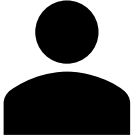


# LibKey Discovery UX Evaluation – Fall 2023

Study conducted in October 2023 by the TTU Library UX Unit



9 undergraduates participated in this study.



Participants completed a short task and a brief interview in return for snacks and library swag.

Overall the students thought the wording was clear and understandable.

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Initial questions:  
*Is the OneSearch LibKey feature wording clear and understandable? Do any of its links seem redundant?*

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- Users overall liked that the LibKey feature links reduced the number of clicks it takes to get to an article.
- Users liked how the feature gave them the option to either directly download a PDF of the article or go directly to the full text of the article.
- User generally did not realize that the links were present because of their design and placement.

As a result of testing, we recommended the following solutions:

- Consider changing the feature link colors and styles to make them more visible.
- Consider changing some of the surrounding non-feature link colors and styles to create better cohesion on the OneSearch results page.
- Keep the “Read Online” and “Download PDF” links.
- Remove the other LibKey feature links since they were rarely encountered.

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Bottom line:  
*LibKey is a useful feature, but is currently not very noticeable to users.*

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We want library patrons to use these LibKey features to access the online research materials they want with fewer clicks. Given how non-noticeable the feature currently is, we hope that these changes will make the feature stand out while not obstructing other relevant information.
