

Texas Tech University School of Music

Graduate Assistantship in Piano Performance

Stipends between \$10,500 and \$12,000 annually with tuition and select fee waivers.

DUTIES

Duties may include various combinations of playing in individual vocal/instrumental rehearsals and lessons; performing in juries, recitals and masterclasses; participating in large ensembles (orchestra, band, choir, opera) and variety of courses (opera scenes, conducting seminars), and/or other department responsibilities as needed.

STIPEND FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR

Stipends for Graduate Assistants are available to qualifying Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA) and Master of Music (MM) students, to be paid as a salary in monthly installments from October through June. Master's stipend: \$10,500.00; DMA stipend: \$12,000.00. Additional fellowships and scholarships may be available for select students.

TUITION WAIVER AND FEES

Teaching Assistant positions provide significant reductions in all but a portion of tuition and fees, as well as Texas Resident status. Fees vary depending on enrollment.

BENEFITS

In-state tuition and eligibility for medical insurance at a reduced rate.

They have ample performance opportunities, both on and off-campus, collaborating with esteemed faculty, accomplished peers, and prestigious guest artists through masterclasses. Graduates excel in diverse career paths, including performance, education at all levels, music management, and have secured faculty positions at various music institutions worldwide, reflecting the program's dedication to fostering excellence and innovation.

Lubbock is a major cultural center of West Texas with a population of nearly 300,000 that supports the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra, Lubbock Youth Orchestras, Ballet Lubbock, the Louise Hopkins Underwood Center for the Arts, the state-of-the-art Buddy Holly Hall for the Performing Arts and Sciences, numerous galleries, and a variety of other music, dance, and theatre performance organizations and venues. Lubbock offers a quality living experience with a semi-arid climate and housing costs below the national average.
