POSITION PROFILE

The J.T. & Margaret Talkington College of Visual & Performing Arts (TCVPA) School of Music at Texas Tech University invites applications for a tenure-track faculty position as Assistant Professor of Music Theory. This position is for a scholar and educator with an established or emerging academic record and evidence of (or potential for) national/international prominence. The successful candidate will begin service in this full-time position at the beginning of the 2023 fall semester.

POSITION DESCRIPTION

This 9-month faculty position will contribute to an ongoing national/international research agenda via presentations and publications in the area and will take part in a coordinated effort to provide both undergraduate and graduate students with the highest standard of education in music theory.

The successful candidate will join a music theory faculty with specialties in tonal and post-tonal analysis, the analysis of popular music, the analysis of rhythm and meter, music theory pedagogy, music cognition, and the history of music theory. The music theory faculty is committed to providing its students with coursework that is rigorous, diverse in both its methodologies and in the repertoire it covers, and informed by recent scholarship in the field.

The successful candidate will actively participate in the School, College, TTU, and broader Lubbock community by engaging in activities such as: 1) committee work and academic support services such as undergraduate and graduate reviews; 2) recruiting activities for the School of Music; 3) thesis and dissertation committee work; 3) curriculum review and development; 4) supervision of student organizations; 5) participation in sponsored off-campus activities and other forms of community engagement.

REQUIRED QUALIFICATIONS

- 1. Earned doctorate in music theory is required prior to the start date of the position.
- 2. Record of a minimum of two years of relevant professional activity and/or research that demonstrates emerging or established national/international recognition in the field of music theory.
- 3. Record of a minimum of two years of relevant teaching experience in the field of music theory.
- 4. Demonstrated and ongoing commitment to equitable, inclusive, and non-discriminatory pedagogy that serves diverse student populations.
- 5. Ability to teach graduate and undergraduate courses in music theory, especially graduate-level prolongational analysis and tonal and modal counterpoint.
- 6. Ability to recruit and retain a talented and diverse cohort of students to programs within the School of Music and College of Visual and Performing Arts.
- 7. Ability and desire to direct student research and to perform service duties including, but not limited to, recruiting, program-building, curricular review, and programmatic assessment.



PREFERRED QUALIFICATIONS

- 1. Demonstrated record of professional research/creative activity relevant to prolongational analysis.
- 2. Familiarity with music theatre repertoire and ability to teach courses in music theory designed for music theatre students.
- 3. Demonstrated ability to work collaboratively within and outside of the university, regionally, nationally, and internationally.
- 4. Pursuit of external grants in support of research or creative activity, when appropriate and available in the faculty member's field, is encouraged.
