PROGRAM NOTES

Pillars – Katahj Copley

One morning, I woke up unusually early without any apparent reason. I got out of bed, made my way to the living room, and decided to meditate -- something I hadn't done in a while. During my meditation, I felt a soothing warmth coming through the window as I observed the sun rising. It stood like a strong, serene pillar, filling the room with its warmth and casting rose-colored fingers of light. Inspired by this moment, I composed a fanfare. Delving into the concept of light pillars, I discovered they are a natural optical phenomenon caused by light refracting through ice crystals. Combining these two elements formed the essence of the piece -- a majestic fanfare imbued with a rich palette of colors, evoking feelings of freshness, mystery, and grandeur.

Before the Dawn - David Biedenbender

Before the Dawn was written to honor the teaching career of Mr. Dave Gott, who served as director of bands at Haslett High School in Haslett, Michigan for 19 years. It was commissioned by the Haslett High School Band Boosters. Before I started writing this piece, I visited the Haslett High School Band to ask about their experiences with Mr. Gott and to brainstorm ideas for the piece. What struck me most about their observations and memories of Mr. Gott was how he had helped so many of them do things they themselves did not think they could do, both personally and collectively -- he saw potential in them that they could not yet see and helped them achieve goals they could not have even imagined.

I am also fortunate to call Dave Gott my friend. For as long as I've known him, he wakes up well before dawn, getting a head start on the day. For me, this time when the deep blue night sky moves toward day through hues of glorious red and orange is a time of hopefulness, joy, and optimism -- it feels like anything is possible. My hope with this piece is to capture that feeling -- the same optimism, hope, and inspiration that Mr. Gott brough to every student that entered his classroom -- and to celebrate it through music. A simple melody rises from the distant horizon, repeating and expanding each time as more voices join. Eventually the melody gives way to unbridled energy, joy, and wonder,

with soloists and sections collectively weaving their own unique variation of the melody into a colorful tapestry.

Three Images - Joel Love

These three movements all explore their own sound worlds. The first movement, Spring, begins with three simple melodic movements, is through-composed, and is meant to depict a verdant springtime landscape in which people/animals are playing. The Golden Hour is a meditation on the image of the sun setting (or rising). In photography, the term "the golden hour" refers to the time just before and after sunrise/ sunset, during which daylight is reddish and soft. Lastly, Bed Monsters is an unbridled rondo that is evocative of someone or something being chased by a predator. The title comes from my wife, Amelia, who thought it sounded like a monster lurking under the bed (from her childhood...). - Program Note by composer

Daybreak Crossing - David Biedenbender

I lived in Ann Arbor, Michigan, in Washtenaw County for seven years, and I wanted to capture some of the spirit of that wonderful place in this piece. When I think about Washtenaw County, there are many images and experiences that come to mind: warm summer evenings spent in Depot Town along the railroad tracks, sharing a meal with family and friends, guiet autumn walks in the Arboretum, and incredible, exciting concerts in Hill Auditorium, just to name a few. All of these places find a small role in the sound-world of this piece, but one place in particular remains firmly and fondly my favorite: the beautiful Huron River at Argo Park in Ann Arbor. On many quiet, summer mornings, I found myself on or along the Huron, either in a kayak or on a running trail, taking in the serene, glassy surface of the water as the sun slowly rose. As a new day began, I remember feeling an overwhelming sense of adventure and resolve at the thought of all that the new day held. This image -- this feeling -- served as the inspiration for Daybreak Crossing -that of excitement, energy, nervousness, determination, and hope as the brilliant light from the rising sun slowly filled the sky and danced on the surface of the water in that beautiful place I called home.

This Night – David Biedenbender

This Night is a Christmas hymn that was originally written for Minneapolis-based choir VocalEssence. This arrangement for band was created for Alex Kaminsky and the VanderCook College of Music Symphonic Band. The text for the choral version is a setting of the text Dies ist die Nacht, da mir erschienen, (this night is a wondrous revelation), which was written in 1683 by Caspar Friedrich Nachtenhöfer. I used an English translation of the original German poem by Anna B. Hoppe from 1922, which also serves as the text for the Christmas hymn of the same name, commonly set to the tune O Dass Ich Tausen Zungen, written by Johann B. König in 1738. I chose this text because of the beautifully vivid imagery and metaphors for light in the poetry, and because I really enjoy the simple, common rhyme and phrase structure that encouraged me to write simple, clear music.

This night a wondrous revelation Makes known to me God's love and grace; The Child that merits adoration Brings light to our benighted race; And though a thousand suns did shine, Still brighter were that Light divine.

The Sun of Grace for thee is beaming; Rejoice, my soul, in Jesus' birth! The light from yonder manger streaming Sends forth its rays o'er all the earth. It drive the night of sin away And turns our darkness into day.

This Light, which all thy gloom can banish, The bliss of heaven glorifies; When sun and moon and stars shall vanish, Its rays shall still illume the skies. This light through all eternity Thy heaven and all to thee shall be. - Program Note by composer

Wind Symphony No. 1 – Nancy Galbraith

Movement I opens with a pulsating figure in the tuba and bass clarinets, which becomes layered with different elements, creating a polyrhythmic texture. The marimba and xylophone introduce a short melodic phrase that builds into a grand climax that closes the opening section. The middle section develops this melodic phrase and introduces a tonal melody in the flutes which is answered by the horns and saxes. Repeated chords in the brass mark the end of the development and the beginning of the recapitulation.

Movement I ends with a piano solo and moves attaca into the second movement. The euphonium presents the melodic theme of Movement II. After the saxophones continue this theme, with the flutes now accompanying, the solo oboe makes a very simple melodic statement which gradually builds into a great climax in the brass. The piano returns, this time accompanying a brass chorale, which fades away closing the second movement.

Movement III opens with a vivacious driving fanfare. After this material recaps, the piece concludes with the fanfare motive played by the trombones accompanied by the snare drum. - Program Note by composer
