THE BERNARD OSHER FOUNDATION

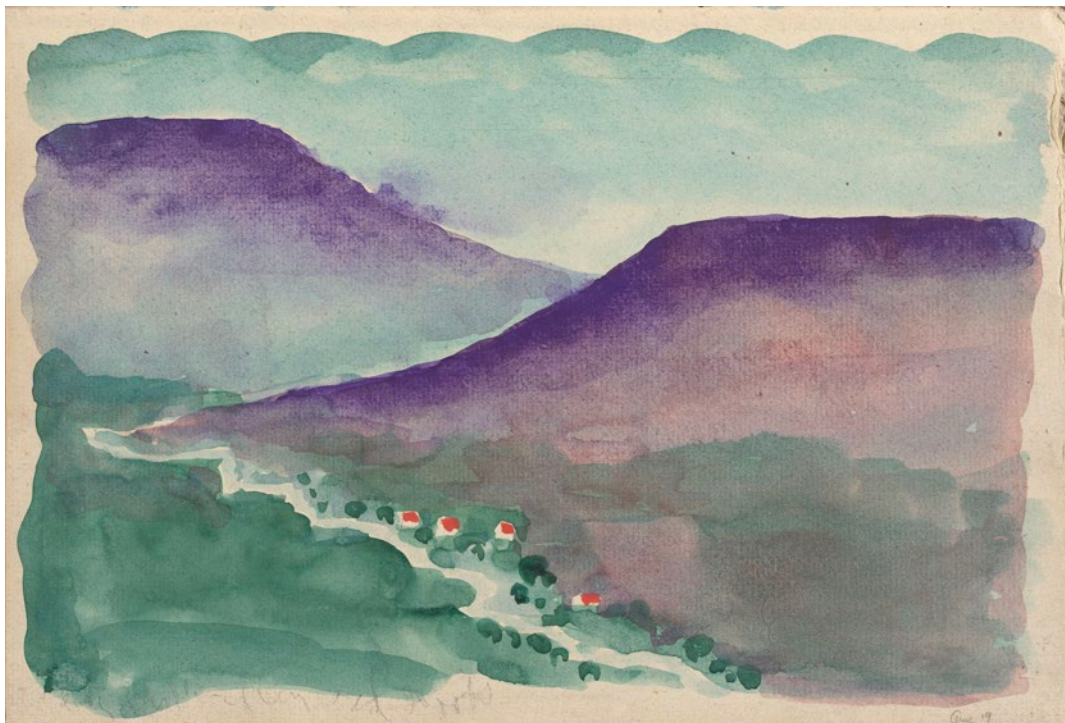

WHAT IS OSHER LIFELONG LEARNING INSTITUTE (OLLI)?

OLLI began as a continuing education program at Texas Tech University in 2002-2003 as Texas Tech Lifelong Learning. In 2008, endowment support was received from the Bernard Osher Foundation. In recognition of its affiliation with the Osher Foundation and as one of 125 such institutes nationwide, Texas Tech Lifelong Learning was re-named Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Texas Tech University.

We are self-sustaining, supported through membership dues, class fees, an endowment from the Bernard Osher Foundation, donations and in-kind support from Texas Tech University. *No tests, no grades, no research papers—just intellectual stimulation.*

What does membership cost?

Membership is \$35 per person, valid for a year from date of purchase, and does not include cost of individual courses.

Who teaches OLLI classes?

Most of our classes are taught by distinguished professors, both active and retired. Other instructors are experts in their fields, university doctoral students or OLLI members. There is one common denominator: they teach because they enjoy education and OLLI students.

What happens for weather or other emergency cancellations?

OLLI follows the same policy as Texas Tech University for cancellations because of weather or other acts of nature or emergencies. If TTU classes are canceled, OLLI classes are also canceled. Postings can be found at emergency.ttu.edu as well as on local television or radio stations. OLLI reserves the right to substitute instructors, rearrange class schedules or cancel classes because of low enrollment or illness. In case of class cancellation or a schedule change, you will be notified and may receive a credit for another class in the same semester or a refund.

What if I have to cancel my registration?

Because space in classes is limited, please let the office know as soon as possible if you need to cancel a class registration. It is important that you are aware that canceling any class requiring bus transportation, food or supplies will result in loss of the registration fee unless the member is able to find a replacement to attend in their place. For all other classes, we ask that members let us know of their cancellation at least four days in advance to be eligible to receive a credit transfer to be applied to another class or a refund. Members may also choose to donate their refund if they wish to support OLLI operations.

We do provide full refunds on a case-by-case basis for illness, medical emergencies, etc. Membership fees cannot be credited or refunded.

ONLINE CLASSES

Osher Online courses offer a unique blend of convenience, affordability and diverse learning experiences. By joining these online classes, participants can connect with fellow OLLI members from across the country, all from the comfort of their homes. Each course is a 6-week series class, occurring on the same day/time for \$60.

Playing a key role in global biological exploration since 1846 and housing millions of specimens, it supports vital research in taxonomy, biodiversity, and conservation. The National Museum of Natural History and the Tropical Research Institute lead global studies in ecology and species discovery. Through various initiatives, it promotes long-term ecological research and open scientific access, making it a cornerstone of biological science.

Thomas Lee, Jr. has taught biology at Abilene Christian University since 1994. He received his Ph.D. from Texas A&M, his master's from Angelo State and his bachelor's from Texas A&M.

First Tour of 1921 Odd Fellows Building IP

A testament to Abilene's rich fraternal and architectural heritage, this building has had several lives, and will now be the home of Belt Buckle Distillery. Known after 1940 as Carpenter's Hall, the building incorporates elements of Classical Revival and Beaux-Arts design. We will tour what is open at the time of the course, with instructor Larry Sanders providing commentary on the history and plans for the future. Closed-toe shoes are recommended, not compliant with ADA while under construction.

Larry Sanders started Belt Buckle Distillery with his son Keith in 2017. Both Sanders are graduates of Abilene Christian University. Keith serves as Director of Production.

Lewis & Clark Among the Indians H

The Lewis & Clark Expedition encountered over 50 Indian tribes during their 3-year trip. For many tribes, the Expedition members were the first Europeans they met. The Expedition served as diplomats to unknown tribes. They traded goods and services for food and knowledge. They also studied the tribes to gather ethnographic information for President Jefferson. Interactions opened the west to future explorers.

Instructor Steve Kniffen, MA, MAS, has spent 35 years researching, writing and teaching Lewis & Clark. He twice retraced the Expedition route instructing traveling Elderhostels from St. Louis to Portland. He authored 190 news articles retracing the Expedition during the bicentennial, 2004-2006.

David D. Schafer will provide course participants with insights into Lyndon B. Johnson's historic presidency during the 1960s when he was governing the nation from the LBJ Ranch near

Stonewall, Texas. Through stories, descriptions, and media such as photographs and audio-visual recordings, Schafer will share this compelling history with attendees.

Schafer, a native of Kansas, worked for the National Park Service for 32 years at historic sites in Kansas, Hawaii, Missouri, Puerto Rico, Oklahoma and Texas. In 2019, he retired as a supervisory park ranger at Lyndon B. Johnson National Historical Park. In addition to researching and writing, he leads trolley tours of historic Fredericksburg.

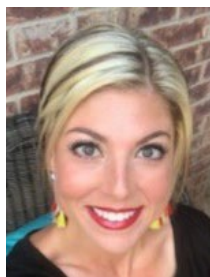
250 Years: The Legacy and Future of the U.S. Navy

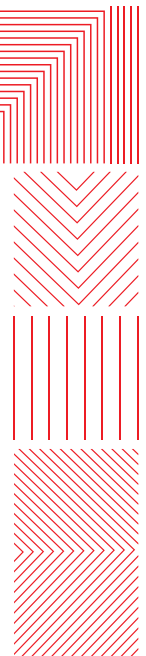


Some Firsts at the New College: A Look at Fall 1925 at Texas Technological College H
