






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Welcome to the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Texas Tech University!

Our Mission

The mission of Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Texas Tech University is to provide enjoyable and stimulating non-credit learning and cultural opportunities for its members.

What is Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI)?

OLLI began as a continuing education program at Texas Tech University in 2002-2003 as Texas Tech Lifelong Learning. In 2008, endowment support was received from the Bernard Osher Foundation. In recognition of its affiliation with the Osher Foundation and as one of 119 such institutes nationwide, Texas Tech Lifelong Learning was re-named Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Texas Tech University. We are self-sustaining, supported through membership dues, class fees, an endowment from the Bernard Osher Foundation, donations and inkind support from Texas Tech University. *No tests, no* grades, no research papers – Just intellectual stimulation.

What are the requirements to join?

Everyone age 50 and older may join. The only prerequisite is a desire to learn.

What does membership cost?

Membership is \$35 per person, valid from September to July, and does not include cost of individual courses.

Who teaches OLLI classes?

Most of our classes are taught by distinguished professors, both active and retired. Other instructors are experts in their fields, university doctoral students or OLLI members. There is one common denominator: they teach because they enjoy education and OLLI students.

How do I sign up?

Below are the methods to register for memberships, classes and other events:

- Get a 3% discount if you pay online! Using a credit card, register online through our website *www.olli. ttu.edu*. We accept VISA, MasterCard, and Discover.
- Memberships or classes with food, transportation or supplies are not eligible for the discount.
- Mail registration form in catalog or printed from OLLI website *www.olli.ttu.edu* with a check to OLLI, P.O. Box 45001, Lubbock, Texas 79409-5001 or bring into the OLLI office.



What if I have to cancel my registration?

Because space in classes is limited please let the office know as soon as possible if you need to cancel a class registration. It is important that you are aware that canceling any class requiring bus transportation, food or supplies will result in loss of the registration fee unless the member is able to find a replacement to attend in their place.

For all other classes, we ask that members let us know of their cancellation at least 4 days in advance to be eligible to receive a credit transfer to be applied to another class or a refund. Members may also choose to donate their refund if they wish to support OLLI operations. We do provide full refunds on a case-by-case basis for illness, medical emergencies etc. Membership fees cannot be credited or refunded.

What happens for weather or other emergency cancellations?

OLLI follows the same policy as Texas Tech University for cancellations because of weather or other acts of nature or emergencies. If TTU classes are canceled, OLLI classes are also canceled. Postings can be found at *www. emergency.ttu.edu* as well as on local television or radio stations. OLLI reserves the right to substitute instructors, rearrange class schedules, or cancel classes because of low enrollment or illness. In case of class cancellation or a schedule change, you will be notified and may receive a credit for another class in the same semester or a refund.

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Spring Kick-Off Looking Ahead – State of the World in 2017

America's new President will face a number of serious international challenges -- some left over from previous administrations, and others erupting now. This presentation will be a roundup of the globe's current and expected hot button geopolitical issues including Russia and Europe, China and Asia, the Middle East, and the ongoing problems of terrorism. We will also look back to see 2016's hits and misses, as well as look forward to gain an appreciation of the intricacies and interconnectedness of the globe we call home. A time for questions and discussion will follow lecture.

Instructor: Ambassador Tibor Nagy is Vice Provost for International Affairs at Texas Tech University and lectures nationally on Africa, foreign policy, international development, and U.S. diplomacy. He has also advised U.S. Presidential candidates during the current and past two election campaigns on African policy. Before coming to TTU, he served as U.S. Ambassador to Ethiopia and Guinea, and deputy ambassador in Nigeria, Cameroon and Togo. Ambassador Nagy came to the U.S. as a political refugee from Hungary, and received his B.A. from Texas Tech and M.S.A. from George Washington University, and was in the U.S. Diplomatic Service from 1978-2003.



Eastern Women Artists in the American West: Georgia O'Keeffe, Elaine de Kooning, and Nancy Holt

This course will address how American women artists in the twentieth century found unexpected freedom, independence, and new aesthetic styles in the Middle-American West, a region too often overlooked in narratives of modern art that tend to focus on the coastal regions as the primary art centers. We will look specifically at three women—Georgia O'Keeffe, Elaine de Kooning, and Nancy Holt—who were trained in Eastern America, but who spent significant portions of their life in middle America, including West Texas, where they discovered new teaching opportunities, new markets and patronage, and new inspirations based on the vast expanses of the American High Plains.

Instructor: Amy Von Lintel, Ph.D., received her BA from the University of Kansas, her MA from Southern Methodist University, and her Ph.D. from the University of Southern California. Her research has been generously supported by her home institution as well as the American Association of University Women, the Friends of the Princeton University Library, and the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum. She currently lives in Amarillo, Texas with her husband, two adopted daughters, one foster son, and their basset hound puppy, Fred.

Current Topics I Survived – Reflections of a Kidnapped Doctor

In September 2011, *Anatomy of a Kidnapping*, Dr. Berk's inspiring personal account of surviving an abduction in 2005, was published and received the Book of the Year Silver Award in 2011 given by True Crime, adult non-fiction. He was honored with the Boston University Distinguished Alumni Award in 2012. That same year, University Medical Center in Lubbock established the Steven Berk Endowed Chair in Medical Excellence.

Join Dr. Berk as he discusses the writing of his book, *Anatomy of a Kidnapping*, his reflections on crime, drugs and guns and his explanation of the Oslerian principle of Aequanimitas - what it means in the practice of medicine and how it helped him through his kidnapping.

Instructor: Steven Lee Berk, M.D., was appointed Dean of the School of Medicine in 2006 and the Executive Vice President and Provost, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, in 2010. Dr. Berk graduated from Boston University School of Medicine and completed his Internal Medicine residency and Infectious Disease fellowship at Boston City Hospital. He is board certified in Internal Medicine and Infectious Disease with a certificate of added qualification in Geriatrics.

Food Security and Scarcity: Why Ending Hunger is so Hard

Food Security and Scarcity will look at hunger and food insecurity in our own backyard. Hunger hurts the most vulnerable members of our communities. The United States Department of Agriculture estimates that more than 93,000 citizens living in the South Plains are food insecure. Hunger robs them of energy, dignity, and hope. "Food Security and Scarcity" will define food insecurity, investigate its causes, highlight the impact it has on individuals and our community, as well as ways to end hunger.

The class will include a tour of the South Plains Food Bank's new home at the J. T. and Margaret Talkington Distribution Center.

Instructor: David Weaver, M.A. M.Div., is the CEO of the South Plains Food Bank, a position he has held since 1997. He holds both a B. A. in Sociology and a M.A. in Theater Arts as well as a M.Div. from Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. A Lubbock native, he is married to Keren. They have one daughter, Grace.

Ambassador Nagy will also briefly discuss the major goals of U.S. foreign policy, and what embassies do – since these factors impact the work of the Ambassador.

FBI Turned "Inside Out"

Come learn about the FBI from past to present from the perspective of a Special Agent of 25 years serving in the FBI. We will discuss significant cases and the workings of the Federal System - the best and the worst of the FBI. After covering the challenges and changes of the FBI now and into the future, we will discuss the evolution of Federal Law Enforcement and whether it is staying true to the Constitution or becoming a "government police force". Is the FBI still a true Independent Agency or has it become a "Political Enforcement Entity?"

Instructor: Chief Kyle Bonath, M.A., has recently retired from the FBI after serving for twenty-five years in a wide range of operational and leadership positions. Bonath earned his bachelor's and master degrees in accounting from Texas Tech University. The History of Spanish Renaissance Architecture through Texas & Texas Tech University

Spanish architecture came to the New World from sixteenth century Spain in the form and design of Spanish missions. The building design seemed well suited to the tablelands of West Texas, so similar in color and character to those of Central Spain and so suited to the Spanish background of southwestern history.

So it was the architecture chosen for the first buildings on the Texas Tech campus in the early 1920's by the architects, Sanguinet, Staats, and Hedrick of Fort Worth and William Ward Watkin of Houston. The material selected was mat brick with roofs of red mission tile.

Texas Tech University has maintained the continuity of this architecture for the past 90 plus years, not only on the Lubbock campus but also on many of the other campuses. How this has been accomplished over these many years is a very intriguing story and shows the university's dedication to the overall master plan. There will also be an update on new construction and master planning of the Lubbock campus and others as well.

Instructor: Michael Molina, Vice Chancellor of Facilities Planning & Construction for Texas Tech University System. Throughout his professional career, he has collectively managed a capital improvement and development portfolio exceeding \$2.2 billion. Mr. Molina assumed the position as the vice chancellor of facilities planning and construction (FP&C) for the Texas Tech University System on April 1, 2010.

World of Tomorrow: 1939-40 New York World's Fair, Hope and Terror

This two part class will view and evaluate the "Future" as envisioned at the New York World's Fair of 1939-40 in two films. During the first session we will view *The World of Tomorrow*, a documentary observing the 50th anniversary of the Fair. We'll examine the idea behind the Fair, the planning and construction, and the two years of operation. The Fair was a vision of hope as the country was emerging from the Depression, only to see that hope dashed as war clouds gathered and much of the world was at war by the Fair's closing in the autumn of 1940. Well before 9/11 a terrorist attack occurred at the Fair - this little known event will be reviewed.

The second session will include a short film *The City*. This movie was shown at the Fair as a vision of the city of the future through urban planning. The soundtrack is by Aaron Copeland. A segment of this film is shown in *The World of Tomorrow*. We will discuss the semi utopian plan for new cities proposed and built during the Roosevelt years and where they stand today.

Canyon Lakes Project – The Rest of the Story

The Yellowhouse Canyon has always been the most beautiful natural area of Lubbock. Unfortunately, during the growth of Lubbock, it became the place to hide the ugliest parts of our urbanization process. By 1968, except for MacKenzie State Park, there were three major wrecking yards, an asphalt batch plant, a concrete batch plant, numerous caliche pits, the City's garbage dump, and many instances of private dumping in the canyon. In 1968, the City Planning Department devised a plan to reclaim the canvon, build a series of recreational dams and use reclaimed water as a water source. The concept became a part of the "Goals for the 70's" and after approval of a 2.8 million dollar bond issue after the 1970 Lubbock Tornado, numerous State and Federal grants made the concept a reality. To date, the Lubbock Canyon Lakes Project is still the largest water reuse recreational project in the United States. This class will unveil the behind-the-scene efforts to make it a reality.

Instructor: Jim Bertram, FAICP, became the Senior City Planner for the City of Lubbock within two years of graduation from Texas Tech University in 1966, with a B.S. in Parks Administration. In the 1970s, he completed graduate studies at Texas Tech in Urban Design, Land Use Law and City Planning. He served two years as Director of Planning for Wichita Falls, Texas from 1968-1970 and returned to Lubbock as Director of Planning following the 1970 Lubbock tornado.

That mountain is doubling in size every two years, and by 2020 the data we create and copy annually will reach 44 zettabytes, or 44 trillion gigabytes. Some argue that this abundant data resource has become the "new oil". Businesses are eager to drill to unlock the mysteries of disease, unblock our traffic jams, and solve industry's most pressing question: what do consumers really want?

In this class we will talk about privacy and the law in a society that wants to know everything about everyone.

Instructor: Steve Black, J.D., LL.M., earned his J.D. from Brigham Young University and an LL.M. in Taxation from the University of Washington. He is the Associate Dean for Strategy and Innovation at the Texas Tech University School of Law. He has been a Visiting Scholar at the National University of Singapore, and has taught at various law and business schools in the U.S.

She obtained a J.D. and a Ph.D. in Environmental Toxicology from Texas Tech University.

How Do Scientists Come Up with those Crazy Ideas? The Scientific Method And How It Works

Famously, Thomas Edison tried thousands of times to develop his light bulb before coming up with the filament that worked: "I speak without exaggeration when I say that I have constructed three thousand different theories in connection with the electric light, each one of them reasonable and apparently to be true. Yet only in two cases did my experiments prove the truth of my theory." T. A. Edison

Modern scientists take the same approach, testing theories using the Scientific Method. In this class we will talk about the Scientific Method, about different kinds of experiments that can be developed using that Method, and try our hands at using the Scientific Method to understand a real human disease.

Instructor: Clinton C. MacDonald, Ph. D., did his undergraduate work at Middlebury College in Vermont, where he developed a keen interest in molecular biology research. After his Ph. D. at Stony Brook University, he did post-doctoral work at Princeton University, where he was supported by fellowships from the American Cancer Society and the Howard Hughes Medical Institute. In 1995, Dr. MacDonald was hired by the Department of Cell Biology & Biochemistry at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, where he is now a Professor and Associate Chair.

Shining Light on Solar Energy

The course will provide an overview of the many factors which affect the implementation of solar energy as an alternative power source. We will discuss the process of collecting solar light and turning it into useable electricity, including the manufacturing processes that are used to produce solar panels. We will then look at how market forces and governmental policies promote and limit deployment on a broad scale. An expected learning outcome is that students will have the knowledge required to make informed decisions about personal and public use of solar generated power.

Instructor: Tim Dallas, Ph.D., is a professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering and Associate Dean of the Graduate School at Texas Tech University. His research interests include Microelectromechanical Systems (MEMS) for application in education, medicine, and sports. The classes he offers include: *Solar Energy, Technology Startup-Lab*, and *Introduction to MEMS*.

Inadvertent Weather Modification: Do Humans Play a Significant Role in Our Weather?

This class will present a theoretical basis for why human activities such as irrigation, wind farms, and urban heat islands could be expected to play a significant role in the evolution of our weather. The existence of chaos in the atmospheric system will be discussed, which ultimately provides the mechanism for small changes to the atmosphere to modify the weather days later and thousands of miles away. Early experimental results will be shared that describe the nature of inadvertent weather modification from wind farms and irrigation in the Midwest U.S.

Instructor: Brian Ancell, Ph.D., joined the Texas Tech University Geosciences faculty in 2009 where he researches atmospheric predictability. Dr. Ancell received his Ph.D. in Atmospheric Sciences from

the University of Washington in 2006, and then was a postdoctoral scholar at the same institution for three years. Dr. Ancell received his B.S. in Civil Engineering from the University of Illinois.
