

Our Mission

The mission of Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Texas Tech University is to provide enjoyable and stimulating non-credit learning and cultural opportunities for its members.



What is Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI)?

OLLI began as a continuing education program at Texas Tech University in 2002-2003 as Texas Tech Lifelong Learning. In 2008, endowment support was received from the Bernard Osher Foundation. In recognition of its affiliation with the Osher Foundation and as one of 120 such institutes nationwide, Texas Tech Lifelong Learning was re-named Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Texas Tech University. We are self-sustaining, supported through membership dues, class fees, an endowment from the Bernard Osher Foundation, donations and inkind support from Texas Tech University. *No tests, no grades, no research papers – just intellectual stimulation.*

What are the requirements to join?

Everyone age 50 and older may join. The only prerequisite is a desire to learn.

What does membership cost?

Membership is \$30 per person, valid for a year from date of purchase, and does not include cost of individual courses.

Who teaches OLLI classes?

Most of our classes are taught by distinguished professors, both active and retired. Other instructors are experts in their fields, university doctoral students or OLLI members. There is one common denominator: they teach because they enjoy education and OLLI students.

How do I sign up?

Below are the methods to register for memberships, classes and other events:

- Register securely online at *www.olli.ttu.edu*. We accept VISA, MasterCard and Discover.
- Mail a completed registration form with a check.
 The form can be found in this catalog or printed from www.olli.ttu.edu. See form for details.
- Bring completed form with check to the OLLI office in Fredericksburg (Monday-Thursday, noon-5 p.m.) or Highland Lakes (Tuesday-Friday 9 a.m.-2 p.m.).

What if I have to cancel my registration?

(Applies to members and non-members)
You must submit your cancellation in writing or by email
NO LATER THAN THE SEVENTH DAY BEFORE THE FIRST
SESSION OF A CLASS. We ask that you accept a credit
towards the fee for another class or event in same semester,
but if a refund is preferred, one will be applied to the credit
card used to register for canceled class. No cancellations or
credits are allowed for any classes with bus transportation,
food, or supplies. You may allow a substitute for your spot.
If you pay online with a credit card, a refund is applied to
same card in 2-3 weeks. If you pay by check, a refund can
take 60-90 days to process.

What happens for weather or other emergency cancellations?

In case of questionable weather call (830) 990-4948 for Fredericksburg and (830) 693-0478 for Highland Lakes to confirm if class has been canceled. OLLI reserves the right to substitute instructors, rearrange class schedules, or cancel classes because of low enrollment or other reasons. In case of class cancellation or a schedule change, you will be notified and may receive a credit for another class in the same semester or a refund.

Guantanamo Bay: A Legal Battlefield

This course covers the legal issues that have arisen since the United States opened Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, for detention of suspects and detainees in the war on terror. The instructor will provide an update on historical developments, political considerations, justice processes, terror cases, supreme court scrutiny and public criticism. Case scenarios and relevant considerations will also be included so that the audience can better understand the dynamics of the international conflict in which we are involved.

Prior to becoming a lawyer, Mark served an extended period on active and reserve rolls as a U.S. Air Force officer. 

Recovering America's Wildlife Act: A New Approach to Wildlife Conservation

We are dependent on healthy ecosystems for food, fiber, clean water, clean air and outdoor recreation. More than 15,000 species of fish and wildlife are in decline across the nation – 1,300 of these species are found in Texas. This course will introduce potentially game-changing legislation: the Recovering America's Wildlife Act. If passed, Texas would be eligible for more than \$63 million/year to conserve and restore wildlife and their habitats and to educate and engage Texans.

Instructor: Rachel Rommel is the statewide coordinator for the Texas Alliance for America's Fish and Wildlife. She holds a master's in wildlife science from Texas A&M University where she conducted research related to biodiversity stewardship. Rachel has worked in wildlife conservation for 10 years and has provided support to many Texas programs for threatened and endangered species.


An In-Depth History of the Rural Common Schools of Gillespie County

Germans immigrating to Gillespie County (1846-1878) were escaping social, intellectual and political repression in the German states under Metternich and came to settle on free land grants offered by the Republic/State of Texas. The Germans sponsored by the Verein were educated farmers, mechanics and professionals who resisted assimilation and retained their German language and culture in close-knit communities. The Texas school laws of 1856-1860 created a system of public free schools or common schools, and Gillespie was one of the earliest counties to establish common country schools employing an inventive blend of local and state support to create a distinctive rural school typology not found elsewhere in Texas. They insisted the schools be compulsory, free of religious and political influences and locally controlled. From selected case studies, this presentation analyzes findings gathered through archival research, oral histories and field documentation mapping the cultural and architectural development of the German country schools unique to Gillespie County.

Texas Rangers, 1850-1873

In the first two sessions, we talked about how the Texas Rangers got their start in 1823. The small group of Texas Rangers had their hands full dealing with the Native Americans, bandits and cattle rustlers. During the buildup of the United States engaging in a Civil War, the big challenge was how the Texas Rangers were going to deal with it. We will talk about the Texas Rangers and the Civil War, and the period after the war which was a very tough time for all the peoples of Texas. I will close this session leading up to what is known as the Frontier Battalion which got its start around 1873.

How the Manhattan Project and Nuclear Power Changed the World

The development of nuclear weapons in the period 1939-1945 forever changed the world in which we live. Many of the world's most brilliant scientists contributed to the effort, all in complete secrecy. In this series of three lectures, we will meet these people, learn of the massive installations that were built, study the management challenges associated with the project and discuss the technical problems that were solved. Following the Second World War, many of the scientists and engineers who had worked on the Manhattan Project turned their attention to the development of nuclear power for peaceful purposes. Today, nuclear power plants supply about 20 percent of the nation's electricity, the second largest source of electricity in the United States. We will review the design and operation of these plants with particular emphasis on safety and environmental issues.

Dr. Griffy has held appointments at the Applied Research Laboratories at UT and has served as a consultant to the Los Alamos National Laboratory and other defense-related agencies of the U.S. government.

Meteorites: An Amazing Window Into the Formation of Our Solar System (second in a two-part series)

On a given day, about 60 tons of space material enters our atmosphere. Fortunately, most of it never makes it to the ground; but the pieces that do are earth shattering literally and scientifically. The question of how our solar system formed has fascinated mankind for millennia. Little did we know that some of the most important clues would, literally, fall from the sky! We will discover what we have learned about these rocks from space with research tools from the Hubble Space Telescope to the electron microscope. A hands-on lab session will include samples of a wide variety of meteorites, including a slice of moon rock and samples of meteorites found in Texas. We'll look at some simple tests that will let participants know if they have found a rock from space and see microscopic views of meteorite features that rival the beauty of majestic stained-glass windows!

Current Budget Projection for 2019

In November 2017, Congress passed and the president signed into law the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. This is a substantial revision in U.S. federal tax law: especially, as that law applies to corporations. The law was lauded as providing jet fuel that will supercharge the economy. Supporters promised that the lower corporate tax rate would increase jobs and wages as firms would use their tax savings to reinvest in the U.S., build more plants, invest in new equipment and hire new employees. Critics argued that firms would use the money instead to pay dividends to shareholders and/or buy back stock. The extent to which the actual response of corporate America leaned toward the former prediction versus the latter will effectively determine the economic and revenue effects of the tax change. In this course, we will review how U.S. firms responded to the new tax law and how major economic indicators have changed since passage of the 2017 tax law.
