and intellectual stimulation in an organization of like-minded people who value the joy of learning.

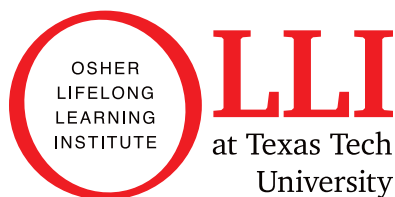

Our Mission

The mission of Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Texas Tech University is to provide enjoyable and stimulating non-credit learning and cultural opportunities for its members.

What is Osher Lifelong Learning Institute?

OLLI began as a continuing education program at Texas Tech University in 2002-2003 as Texas Tech Lifelong Learning. In 2008, endowment support was received from the Bernard Osher Foundation. In recognition of its affiliation with the Osher Foundation and as one of 120 such institutes nationwide, Texas Tech Lifelong Learning was re-named Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Texas Tech University. We are self-sustaining, supported through membership dues, class fees, an endowment from the Bernard Osher Foundation, donations and in-kind support from Texas Tech University. *No tests, no grades, no research papers – just intellectual stimulation.*

What are the requirements to join?

Everyone age 50 and older may join.
The only prerequisite is a desire to learn.

What does membership cost?

Membership is \$35 per person, valid for a year from date of purchase, and does not include cost of individual courses.

Who teaches OLLI classes?

Most of our classes are taught by distinguished professors, both active and retired. Other instructors are experts in their fields, university doctoral students or OLLI members. There is one common denominator: they teach because they enjoy education and OLLI students.

Where is the OLLI office?

Our office is in the Texas Tech Plaza, 5th floor, Suite 513 at 19th and University Avenue, Lubbock, Texas. Our email is olli@ttu.edu, and our phone number is (806) 742-OLLI (6554).

Our No-Solicitation Policy

OLLI class rosters will not be used for solicitation purposes. Any personal information regarding OLLI members such as phone numbers, e-mail or mailing addresses are considered private and not for release without specific permission by the member. The OLLI classroom setting will also not be used for promotion of personally marketed products. However, instructors who are authors may have their books available for display or purchase after class if the book is related to the subject matter of the class. Please contact the OLLI office if you need clarification of this policy.

What happens for weather or other emergency cancellations?

OLLI follows the same policy as Texas Tech University for cancellations because of weather or other acts of nature or emergencies. If TTU classes are canceled, OLLI classes are also canceled. Postings can be found at www.emergency.ttu.edu as well as on local television or radio stations. OLLI reserves the right to substitute instructors, rearrange class schedules, or cancel classes because of low enrollment or illness. In case of class cancellation or a schedule change, you will be notified and may receive a credit for another class in the same semester or a refund.

What if I have to cancel my registration?

Because space in classes is limited, please let the office know as soon as possible if you need to cancel a class registration. It is important that you are aware that canceling any class requiring bus transportation, food or supplies will result in loss of the registration fee unless the member is able to find a replacement to attend in their place.

For all other classes, we ask that members let us know of their cancellation at least four days in advance to be eligible to receive a credit transfer to be applied to another class or a refund. Members may also choose to donate their refund if they wish to support OLLI operations. We do provide full refunds on a case-by-case basis for illness, medical emergencies etc. Membership fees cannot be credited or refunded.

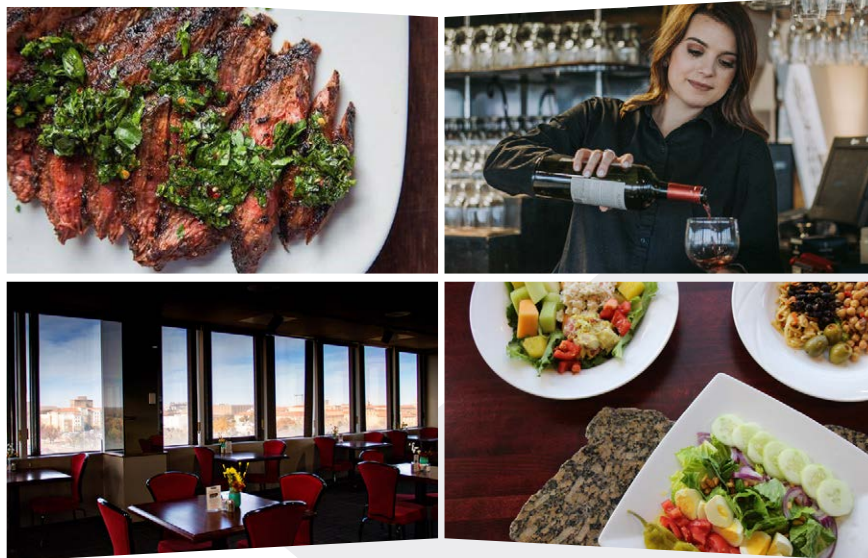

Gambling in Sports – Its History and Today's Realities

Despite legal restrictions and regulations, Americans have enjoyed gambling on a variety of sporting events for generations. Legal only in Nevada, sports gambling continues today with millions wagered annually on March Madness games. Betting on sports proliferated in the United States in the late 20th century, and lawmakers have failed to cut down on the activity. The Congressional Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act passed in 1992 with large support from professional sports leagues and college sports associations, but was struck down by the Supreme Court. Are there any solutions to this ongoing issue?

Keeping You Safe III: Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE)

In the past two decades, horrific mass shootings have been thrust into public consciousness. Mitigating the effects of these sudden incidents is the responsibility of those who serve in our communities' public safety organizations. The average response time for police response to an active attack event is three minutes, but without effective, pre-planned response options for civilians at the scene, many victims can be seriously injured or killed during those three minutes. Lieutenant Bryan Witt will tell us how to be prepared to act to save our own lives, before law enforcement arrives on the scene.
