A BRIEF HISTORY OF PHI BETA KAPPA

 ${f P}$ hi Beta Kappa was founded on December 5, 1776, by five students at the College of William & Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia. With its roots established during the American Revolution, Phi Beta Kappa has for more than two centuries fostered the principles of freedom of inquiry and freedom of thought and expression. These ideas, symbolized on the society's distinctive gold key, promote the foundations of personal freedom, scientific inquiry, liberty of conscience, and creative endeavor. The letters Phi Beta Kappa ($\Phi \beta \kappa$) represent the Greek initials of the society's motto: "Love of learning is the guide of life."

Only about ten percent of colleges and universities in the United States have been approved to shelter chapters of Phi Beta Kappa. Only three public universities in the State of Texas are home to Phi Beta Kappa chapters.

Membership in Phi Beta Kappa is for life. Invitation to membership is a significant academic honor. Acceptance of that invitation reflects a commitment to the liberal arts and sciences and to freedom of inquiry and expression.

Election to membership in Phi Beta Kappa is wholly within the discretion of the members of the local chapter, subject only to the limitations established by the national Phi Beta Kappa Society. There is no right to election solely by reason of fulfillment of a minimum grade point average or of completion of other minimum eligibility requirements in part or in total. Although the honor bestowed by membership in the Society recognizes academic achievement, the qualifications for election to Phi Beta Kappa are independent of the academic policies of Texas Tech University or of any university. A BRIEF OVERVIEW OF TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY

Pounded in 1923, Texas Tech University carries the distinction of being the largest comprehensive institution of higher education in the western two-thirds of the state of Texas and serves a region that is larger than 46 of the nation's 50 states. The Texas Tech System oversees the only single campus in the state that is home to a major university, law school and medical school. Students benefit from this breadth by pursuing degree programs that combine the assets of these outstanding institutions. Students can earn joint degrees in medicine and business, law and public administration, civil engineering and architecture, and a variety of other programs made possible by the combination of colleges and schools on the campus.

Texas Tech University prides itself on being a major comprehensive research university that retains the sense of a smaller liberal arts institution. Although enrollment approaches 30,000, Texas Tech students boast of one-on-one interactions with top faculty and an environment that emphasizes student accomplishment.

Chancellor Kent Hance is the chief executive officer of the Texas Tech System. President Jon Whitmore is the chief executive officer of Texas Tech University, and President John C. Baldwin is the chief executive officer of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center. The Texas Tech System is governed by the Board of Regents who have been appointed by the governor and confirmed by the legislature.

WHAT DOES TEXAS TECH'S STATUS AS A PHI BETA KAPPA INSTITUTION MEAN?

It means that prospective students may be assured they can obtain at Texas Tech an education in the liberal arts and sciences of the quality found only at the top ten percent or so of institutions in the United States. It means that prospective faculty may be assured of affiliation with an institution whose commitment to excellence is proven and established. It means that every degree granted at Texas Tech is enhanced in value. It means permanent association with the very best in American education.
