Discussion

FOLLOWING each Sunday Lecture, a short time will be devoted to informal discussion and conversation on the topic of the day. When practicable, one or two members will be selected in advance to participate in the discussion.

TO meet the desires of those to whom other dates are impracticable, the lectures of Prof. Josiah Royce on "Aspects of Social Psychology" have been placed in the regular Sunday afternoon series.

The Swâmi Sâradânanda, who may soon return to India, and whose work in the Conferences met with such hearty appreciation last season, will give a series of class lectures on "The Vedanta Philosophy" on Mondays and Thursdays, at 4 P.M., in the second and third weeks in November.

Mr. George Willis Cooke of Lexington, Mass., will give a course of six class lectures on "Woman's Place in the History of Humanity," on Friday afternoons in December and January. Admission to course three dollars. Single admission fifty cents.

Mr. Virchand R. Gandhi, B.A., M.R.A.S., of Bombay, India, will give a course of class lectures on "The History and Philosophy of the Jain Religion and Social Conditions in India," during January, 1898.

The Director, Dr. Lewis G. James, will give a series of six class lectures on "Epochs in Early Religious History," on successive Friday afternoons in February and March.

THOUGH the Conferences were primarily intended for students and professional workers in the lines above indicated, the director desires to make them available, as far as possible, to interested non-professional members. A limited number of associate members will accordingly be received, as heretofore, on payment of the annual associate-membership fee of ten dollars. The capacity of the audience-room will probably necessitate the restriction of invitations to members more strictly than was customary last year. Professional, student, and associate members will be continued upon the list unless they otherwise request. Application for membership, and the dues of associate members may be sent to the Director.
