WORKS IN PROGRESS

Qualitative case-study research on female-perpetrated neonaticide (homicide of a newborn). Data on sixteen cases have been gathered; case-identification and data collection are ongoing. Papers have been presented at several sociology conferences. Since Spring 2019, a total of ten undergraduate research assistants have worked on this project. Three students presented research findings at the Southern Sociology Society conference in March 2019. Five students have presented posters at the TTU Undergraduate Research conference. One student is working on the project as an Honors College Undergraduate Research Assistant. Book manuscript is in progress.
