In 2013, even as we continue to recognize the full impact of our global interconnectedness, we struggle to negotiate the often conflicting needs and desires of our individual, group, regional, state, national, and international identities. In holding certain truths to be self-evident, promising certain unalienable rights, in guaranteeing "Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness", do we also not, at the very same time, have to be aware of the price of those rights, the impact of that pursuit on others who have not been assured of those same freedoms and protections? For whom does the pursuit of happiness apply? And to what degree does our understanding of global citizenship, civil rights, and human rights, change the parameters of the way to happiness, dignity, and equality?

Open Teaching Concept 2013 explores the issues of diversity and social justice, access and disparities, policy and poverty over a variety of disciplines, methods, theories, and paradigms. Looking at such topics as human rights, civil rights, hunger, multiculturalism, gender, labor and production, health, education, LGBT rights, economic opportunity, sexual violence, class, religious difference, environmental sustainability - OTC 2013 will allow students, faculty, and staff to dialogue on the larger questions of social responsibility, global citizenship, and the ever-widening, ever-constricting local global nexus.

Teaching Diversity Across the Curriculum is a program initiated by the Cross-Cultural Academic Advancement Center (CCAAC). The program is led and organized by faculty members on the CCAAC's Teaching, Learning, and Connecting (TLC) Through Diversity Advisory Council.
