Teachers' Moral Obligation to Students and their Learning

Session Overview

What are moral obligations university faculty owe our students (with anything less impermissible)?

- 1. Fulfill a duty of care (i.e., offer a helping hand, advice, and mentoring).
- 2. Respect and trust students while safeguarding their rights.
- 3. Communicate regularly and substantively.
- 4. Provide what students pay for—our expertise through sharing of knowledge and experiences and serving as an expert resource.
- 5. Be organized with clear, intellectually challenging assignments (i.e., set high expectations)
- 6. Provide constructive feedback on assignments and throughout each class.
- 7. Facilitate a student-centered learning environment.
- 8. Ensure fairness and justice to each student.
- 9. It is all about students learning.

Enhance student engagement and learning

- 1. Increase communications—meet virtually one-on-one with each student, send out weekly (at a minimum) course updates and upcoming deadlines, and provide suggestions for how to be more successful on each assignment, such as providing examples of outstanding work.
- 2. Strengthen relationships among students to encourage a sense of community (i.e., "we are all in this together"), such as asking each student to create a "selfie" introductory video, using discussion boards including commenting on classmates' posts, and using Microsoft Teams or Zoom Breakout Rooms to facilitate work on group projects.
- 3. Interactive lecturing—limit length of live and video lectures recorded to no more than 15 minutes along with a low-stakes (i.e., a few points on the course grade), formative assessment connected with each and active learning.
