Helicopter Parenting, Affection, and College Students' Game and Social Media Addictive Behaviors


Introduction

Helicopter parenting is a pervasive and problematic parenting style experienced by emerging adults. This parenting style has been connected to young adult internet addiction disorders. With this foundation, the study aimed to identify latent classes of helicopter parenting and affection among four parent-child gender combinations. In addition, we examined whether helicopter parenting and affection latent classes are associated with college students' game and social media addictive behaviors. We identified distinct helicopter parenting and affection latent classes across mother-son, mother-daughter, father-son, and father-daughter groups. In addition, we found a significant association between helicopter parenting and affection latent classes and college students' game and social media addictive behaviors across parent-child gender combinations.
